25 Die in State Traffic in July

Twenty-five persons were killed in Oregon traffic crashes during July, bringing the year's street and highway toll to 201.

It was the lowest July count since 1949 when 24 were killed. Forty died in accidents during July of 1953, 47 in 1952, 33 in 1951, and 56 in 1950.

The July toll may still go higher, Secretary of State Earl F. Newberry cautioned. There is always a possibility that delayed reports will be received or that persons listed as injured may succumb at a later date.

Officials noted that Oregon still is making progress at reducing accidents, injuries and deaths. Accidents are down by several thousand so far this year, and the latest death figure, 201 in seven months, compared with 220

recorded for the some period last year.
