

### NEW PROCESSED WHEAT PRODUCT ADDS VARIETY TO YOUR TABLE

There are many ways to use the new processed wheat product that is becoming so popular at many tables and which has recently become available in Heppner area stores.

It can be used in many instances in place of rice and the "Pilaf" served with steaks, roasts or any meat dish makes a welcome change from potatoes.

Here are some recipes that have found favor with many.

#### Pilaf

1 cup processed wheat (course)  
2 cups boiling broth (if not meat stock use bouillon)  
1/2 large onion, chopped  
1/2 bell pepper, chopped  
1/2 cup celery, diced  
1/2 cube butter  
salt and pepper  
Gently fry onion, pepper and celery in butter until tender-not brown. Stir in the cup of processed wheat, add boiling broth and salt and pepper. Cover and cook over medium heat or in oven about 1 hour. More moisture may be added as the wheat takes up broth.

#### Armenian Wheat

1/4 cup butter  
1 cup processed wheat  
1 3-oz. can broiled, sliced mushrooms and juice

2 beef bouillon cubes  
2 cups hot water  
3/4 cup chopped parsley  
Brown wheat in melted butter. Add mushrooms, mushroom juice and parsley. Dissolve bouillon cubes in water and add to wheat. Bring to boil, cover and simmer until tender.

#### Processed Wheat With Tomato Sauce

1/4 cup butter  
1 medium size onion  
2 beef bouillon cubes  
1 cup boiling water  
1 8-oz. can tomato sauce  
salt and pepper to taste  
1 cup processed wheat (course grind)  
Brown onion in butter. Add dissolved bouillon cubes and tomato sauce, salt and pepper. Add processed wheat and steam one-half hour. Serve as an addition to regular meal.

#### Tomato Wheat Casserole

1 cup processed wheat  
2 1/2 cups canned tomatoes  
1 tablespoon chili powder  
1/2 large onion, 1/2 bell pepper  
1 teaspoon sugar  
4 tablespoons butter, salt and pepper to taste  
Brown lightly onion and bell pepper in butter. Add wheat and to-

atoes. Stir well. Add chili powder, sugar, salt and pepper. Simmer on low heat or in a casserole in oven for 1 hour. Top with grated cheese the last 15 minutes.

### Children's Birth Certificates Should Be Ordered Early

Parents of children needing birth certificates for admission to school for the first time this September were asked Wednesday by the state board of health to obtain them before the fall rush starts.

Deane L. Huxtable, state registrar, said that the number of requests for birth certificates for admission purposes within the next two months is expected to be among the heaviest in Oregon's history, and he warned that "last minute" applications may be delayed.

Huxtable emphasized that not all schools require birth certificates for admission. In the event a certificate is needed, parents should apply to the vital statistics section, state board of health, 1400 S. W. 5th Avenue, Portland 1, giving the name of the child, place of birth and full name of parents. A charge of \$1.00 is made for each copy of a birth certificate, which should be enclosed with the request.

The state board of health files Oregon records only, but Huxtable said his department would furnish information how certificates may be obtained for births occurring in other states.

### Forest Fire Coop Funds Are Announced

Well over \$1 million of federal funds has been earmarked for Oregon and Washington state forestry organizations to assist in the prevention, detection, and control of forest fires during the current fiscal year.

Oregon will receive \$591,056 and Washington \$541,227, the Forest Service announced today. Forty-one other states and the Territory of Hawaii receive federal fire control funds.

The federal-state cooperative program has been in existence since 1911. The objective of the original legislation, strengthened by the Clarke-McNary Act of 1924 is to assist in providing an adequate system of forest fire protection for private and other non-federal timber lands. Funds appropriated by Congress are administered through the Forest Service to the states where direct expenditures are made by state forestry departments.

Regional Forester J. Herbert Stone pointed out that approximately 1/3 of the total annual timber cut in the nation is produced in Oregon and Washing-

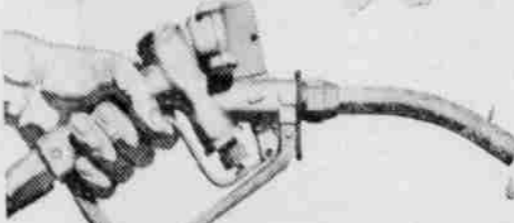
