Coronation Headlines Events at Friday Dress-Up Parade

A large crowd gathered in Heppner last Friday evening to watch the Dress-Up parade, traditional kickoff event of Fair and Rodeo week, and to see Miss Grace Miller of Boardman receive her crown as Rodeo queen.

Miss Miller was crowned with a beautiful white Stetson by chamber of commerce president Jeff Carter, who also introduced the members of her royal court. Each girl was presented with a corsage by Mary Van Stevens.

Following the coronation a program of square dancing demonstrations was given by members of the Heppner Square Dance club, and a kangaroo court was held under the direction of the Heppner Lions club, sponsors of the Dressup parade and accompanying events. Vigilante members circulated through the crowd selling fair buttons and brought a few violators before "acting judge" Mary Van Stevens. A horse trough and stockade had been placed near the intersection of Main and Willow streets and residents were warned that lack of western attire during the coming week could result in a dunking at the regular session of the kangaroo court held Tuesday noon.

The Tuesday session resulted in several local residents being convicted and either fined or dunked. Lions club members handled both affairs.

Reserved tickets are still on sale at a downtown booth or they may be obtained at Phil's Pharmacy up to show time, he said. Grandstand and general admission tickets will be on sale at the grounds with the Heppner Legion post handling this detail.

Daily programs will be on sale both in downtown Heppner during the parade and the arena on Saturday, and will again be available for the Sunday show.

The rodeo committee who have charge of this year's show includes Harold Erwin, Floyd Jones and John Eubanks. Bill Smet-hurst has charge of the parade; Jack Van Winkle, Danes; Jack Loyd, concessions and Phil Blakney, ticket sales.

Bonds To Finance Field Lighting

Plans were progressing rapidly this week toward the long-planned lighting of the Heppner rodeo field, as a move was taken to form a lighting corporation and issue non-interest bearing bonds with which to finance the project.

At a special meeting of the chamber of commerce lighting committee and directors of the organization, it was decided to incorporate the chamber that it might act as the bond-issuing organization and then proceed with the sale of the bonds as quickly as possible. It is planned to repay the investors out of proceeds from activities held on the lighted field.

Estimated cost of the lighting project has been set at approximately \$10,000 and the Heppner Elks Lodge has offered to donate half of the cost of the project, or up to \$5,500. The bonds will be sold to interested local individuals or business firms, and the organization has plans to repay the total cost of the installation within five years.

It is hoped to have the bonds ready within about a week, and the committee plans on having the lights installed in time for use in at least one football game this fall, if sufficient money can be raised quickly.

Farley Motors Gets Forest Service Lot

Farley Motor company this week started using the former Forest Service lot adjacent to the company's present property on May street, following notification from the government that the company was awarded the land following a recent government sale.

The lot had been declared surplus property and was put up for public sale. It lies between the Farley Motor company and the Gilliam and Bisbee buildings. Only the section facing May street was involved in the transaction, the Forest Service retaining the remainder of the plot. James Farley said that for the present he would use the area for new and used car parking, but had plans for future development on the site.

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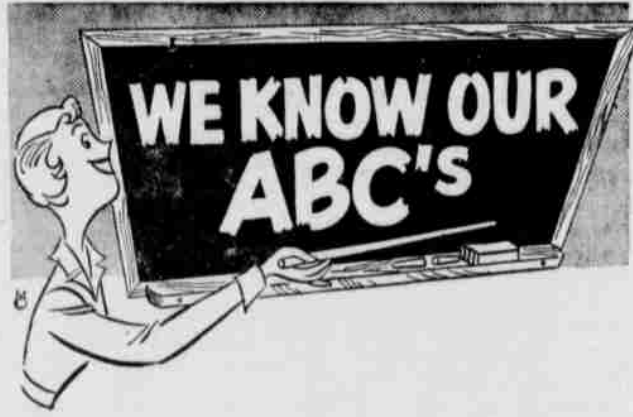
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
