

Winners of Many Fair And Rodeo Events Are Listed

Fair Awards Go To Big Group

The Morrow county Fair and Rodeo wound up its four-day run Sunday with the final rodeo performance and hundreds of persons expressed the belief that all segments of this year's show was one of the best ever presented.

Fair goers viewed the largest collection of exhibits ever shown here, and the number and quality of livestock was unequalled in previous fairs.

Top spot in the Thursday judging was won by Kirk and Robinson who received the open class premier beef award with the greatest number of points in all classes with their polled Herefords. The 4-H grand champion fat beef was won by Dick Williamson, Heppner, and the reserve champion by Skip Emert, Ione. Kenneth Smouse, Ione won the 4-H grand champion sheep, a Southdown ram and Russell Dolven, Lexington, took champion with his Columbia yearling ewe.

Other top 4-H livestock awards were won by Marjorie Peck, of Heppner, grand champion dairy female; Bill Brannon, Ione grand champion fat hog; Ronald McCabe, reserve champion fat hog; Ralph Akers, Ione champion sow and litter of 12; Robert Campbell, Echo, champion female sow; Kit George, Heppner, reserve champion sow.

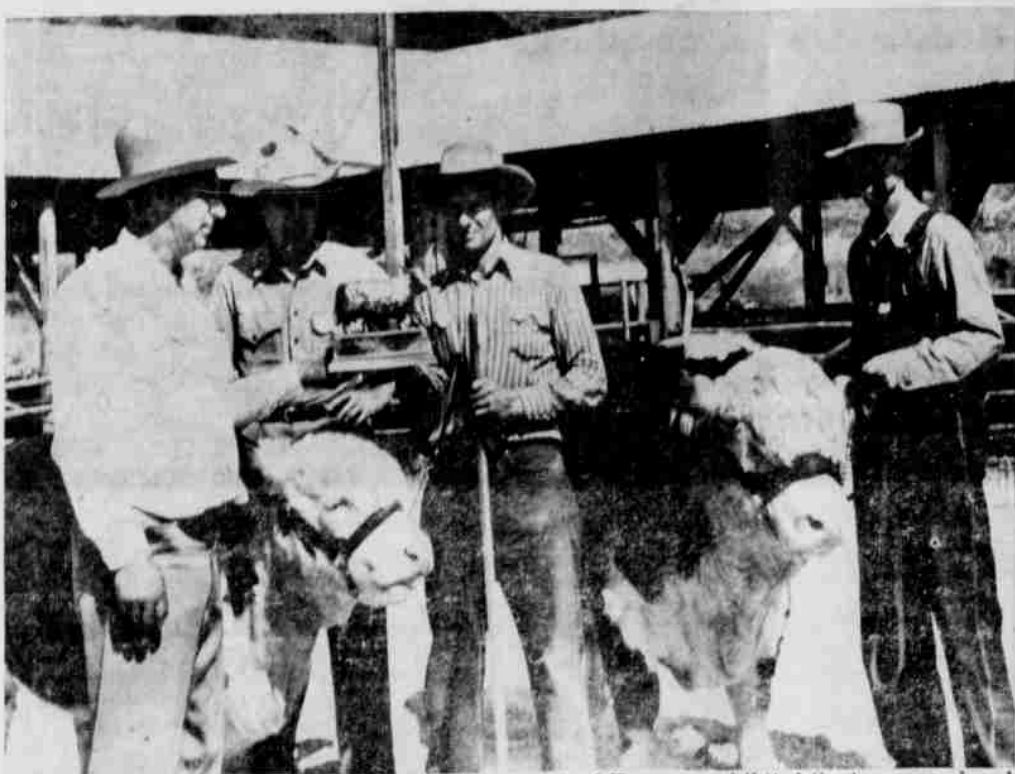

Bob Gammell Wins Saddle in Amateur Calf Roping

Bob Gammell, Heppner, walked off with the top prize of the rodeo, a handmade saddle, when he averaged the best time in the Morrow county amateur calf roping contest. Second place went to Howard Bryant, and James Farley won third spot in the all-amateur event.

Sonny Tureman, John Day cowboy won top money and the gold and silver belt buckle awarded to the best all around cowboy of the two day rodeo. He made the fastest time in the calf roping event with a tie in 13.3 seconds. Bub Gatzman, Waterford, Calif., won the bulldogging event with a snappy time of 6.8 seconds.

Placing in other events were Eddie Akridge, Beaver, Okla. who was the first in the bareback riding; Dick Burke, Pendleton, who had a time of 31.5 seconds for the calf roping, and was followed by Tureman with a time of 31.7 seconds.

Top money in the saddle bronc riding went to Bill Ward, Angels, Camp, Calif.; and Jim Madland, Portland was judged winner of the bull riding.

Akridge took first in the ribbon roping with a time of 31.1 seconds, Tureman second and Billy Healy, Heppner came in a close third. Gene Miles was first in the one go-round bull dogging.

A striking precision drill was presented at the Saturday rodeo by members of the Umatilla Sage Riders with Dr. W. L. Stephenson announcing the event, and Johnny Leinberger, 12 years old trick roper from Umatilla, performed at the Sunday show.

Eddie Brosnan, Heppner was winner of the junior calf roping event and was presented a silver buckle. Larry Fetsch, Heppner, won second place and a pair of silver spurs and straps.

Flag race winner was the Ukiah Evergreen riding club who was presented the Farley trophy.

The Wranglers came in second, and the Umatilla Sage Riders third.

Pony races were won by Judy Sherer, Sandra Eubanks, Geraldine Swaggart, Dianna Fullerton and Eobby Hutchins; the quarter mile cowgirl race by Christine Swaggart on Saturday and Judy Johnson of Ukiah on Sunday. Bill Johnson, Ukiah took the cowboy race Saturday, and Oren Fore, Hermiston, Sunday.

The Wrangler's cowboy breakfast on Sunday morning attracted the largest crowd in its history with over 650 persons being served under the direction of Mrs. Archie Munkers who expressed her thanks to Russell Miller of Boardman who donated his own home grown potatoes for the feed.

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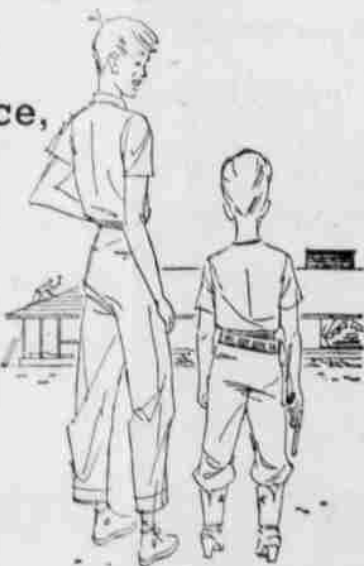


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
