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Nitrogen Fertilizer Problem Discounted; Wheat Checks Slated

Nitrogen fertilizer's role in Columbia Basin wheat production is expected to be further clarified this year by Oregon State College and U. S. department of agriculture.

Wheat samples taken this summer from 50 representative farms in the area are now being checked for effects of different levels of nitrogen on yields and protein content of wheat. A. S. Hunter, OSC-USA soils scientist in charge of the project, says wheat samples are from plots ranging in nitrogen applications from zero up to 120 pounds actual nitrogen per acre.

Meanwhile, OSC crops and soils researchers say present findings discount a recent report that overdoes of nitrogen fertilizer in the area are boosting protein contents of soft wheats beyond levels suitable for specialty flours used in cakes and other pastries.

Pendleton branch experiment station trials in 1951-52 showed that where growers use the most profitable rate of nitrogen to increase yields there is little danger of excess protein content for pastry flours.

H. B. Cheney, OSC soils department head, and D. D. Hill, farm crops head, stated that in low rainfall areas, particularly, excessive nitrogen applications may in some cases rule wheat out of the specialty flour class.

"But these are the exceptions," Cheney said. "For the most part, Basin wheat growers are using too little nitrogen." He added

that the studies on 50 farms now underway should give a clearer picture of regional variations of soils, wheat varieties, and usable moisture—all of which affect protein content of wheat.

Hill emphasized the importance of clear understanding of the protein controversy. "High protein content in itself is not undesirable—it's bad for wheats used for specialty flours, but good for wheats used for bread flours," said the farm crop expert. He said a recommended long-range research program for low rainfall areas is to develop high-yielding wheat varieties used for bread flours.
