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JUST LOOK AT THOSE TAXES!


One of the commonest misconceptions about rural electric systems is that they don't pay taxes. This false impression has been helped along considerably by our bitterest opponents, the commercial power companies.

At the risk of calling those fine people liars, we've got to say, "It just ain't so." We pay our full share of taxes—all rural electric systems do. There is just one exception, and you will admit it is entirely fair after we explain it.

We do not pay Federal income taxes. The reason we don't could not possibly be simpler. Corporation income taxes are based on the profits the corporation makes. This rural electric system, though, is a co-operative organization and provides electricity at cost. So, we don't make any profits to be taxed.

Now, we do have property, so we pay property taxes. And we do have payrolls, so we pay payroll taxes. But we don't have any profits, so we don't pay on income tax on them. What could be more reasonable?

The next time you read or hear the remark that the rural electric systems don't pay taxes, we hope you will remember that we do pay every tax we're supposed to, but that you just can't pay an income tax on profits that aren't there.



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
