CITY ORDINANCE NO. 337 SPECIFIES

Sewer Hookup Deadline

(WITHOUT COST TO PROPERTY OWNERS, EXCEPT FOR \$1.00 INSPECTION PERMIT)

September 23, 1954

City ordinance provides for a one-year period to allow time for all residents to connect to the Heppner sewer system. The deadline for such connection is September 23, 1954. After that date a \$50 hookup charge will be assessed. Until that date only \$1.00 inspection permit fee is charged. Obtain your permit from the city recorder.

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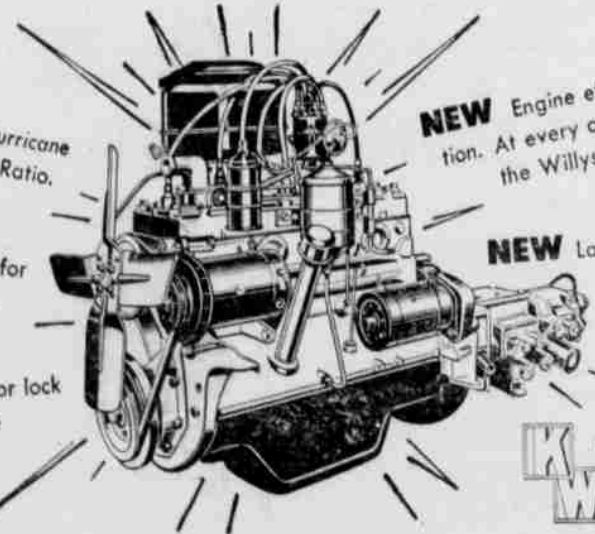
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
