

DIVISIONS LISTED FOR IONE GARDEN CLUB'S FALL FLOWER SHOW

The Ione Garden Club this week released the list of classes and divisions for their annual flower show, "Fantasy in Gold" to be held Sunday, September 26 from 2 to 5 o'clock at the Ione Legion hall. A program of vocal and instrumental music is planned and a silver tea for the benefit of the city park maintenance fund will be held during the afternoon.

Entries will be received from 8 to 10:30 a. m. and complete instructions can be obtained from the club.

The classes will include, under section A, horticulture: (each entry to be one bloom, spray or stalk unless otherwise noted) 1 Alliums; 2 Asters; 3 Begonias; 4 Balsam; 5 Black-eyed susan; 6 Calendula 3 blooms; 7 carnations; 8 Centaurea (corn flower) 3 blooms; 9 Chrysanthemum, (a) summer, (b) fall, 3 blooms, exhibition; 10 coral, 3 stalks; 11 Cosmos, 3 blooms; 12 Dahlia with the following sub-classes: cactus, decorative, pom-pom 2 blooms, specimen, single, miniature 2 blooms, collection of any variety, color or type, one bloom each.

13 Daisies, 2 blooms; 14 delphinium; 15 gallardia, 3 blooms; 16 geranium; 17 gladiolus (a) baby, (b) large; 18 helichrysum, 3 blooms; 19 lilies; 20 marigolds, (a) dwarf 3 blooms; (b) African; 21 michaelmas daisy; 22 nasturtium, 5 blooms; 23 pansies, 3 blooms; 24 petunias (a) single, (b) double; 25 phlox; 26 roses; 27 salvia; 28 sweet peas, 5 blooms; 29 zinnias (a) giant (b) dwarf 3 blooms; 30 any annual not listed; 31 any perennial not listed; 32 collection of annuals.

inches. (b) dinner for 6, center-piece to be viewed from all sides. Table 30 by 60 inches. (c) break-fast tray for patient in bed. 2 miniature not over 3 inches; 3 small, not over 8 inches; 4 all the same color in same color container; 5 fruit and/or vegetables with or without leaves; 6 foliage arrangement of any description; 7 arrangement using dried materials, with or without fresh material; 8 arrangement in metal container; 9 arrangement with wood; 10 mantel or buffet; 11 twin arrangements; 12 coffee table.

Section C—junior gardeners. Class 1 specimen of any plant, flower, fruit or vegetable grown this year. 2 arrangements (a) in a bird or animal container; (b) in a favorite container; (c) tray for a sick doll.

Section D—novelties. Freck, unusual flowers, vegetables or fruits. Plants not generally cultivated in this area.

Section E will cover antiques, decorative, pom-pom 2 blooms, specimen, single, miniature 2 blooms, collection of any variety, color or type, one bloom each.
