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Old, New Blends In Furniture, Trends Reported

Old and new—traditional and modern—are being successfully blended in furniture, according to Myrtle Carter, Oregon State college home furnishings specialist.

To meet the demands of twentieth century homes, furniture of different periods is being used increasingly, she says.

Such nineteenth century traditional styles as Empire, Biedermeier, Regency and Directoire that are popular today borrow their motives from Roman, Greek and Egyptian forms, Mrs. Carter explains. For this reason, these

styles blend well with modern accessories, fabrics and floor coverings.

A refined Colonial design is more formal than Early American that has been much used lately, but it is less formal than Sheraton, Hepplewhite and Chippendale of the eighteenth century period.

The home furnishings specialist said the greatest change in modern styling today is an increased use of surface decoration.

Demands of today's smaller home spaces are bringing manufacturers to release more dual purpose pieces too. Some of them she mentioned are dual sleep pieces, room dividers and chest-on-chest forms.

She cited as current trends in material, the use of leather tiles, silver metals, pressed wood and themoset plastic. A wide new color range has been added to leather, which is being used frequently today by leading decorators, Mrs. Carter noted.

Favored woods include cherry and walnut, the home furnishings specialist said. Another finish that is new is amber mahogany. White is being shown as a finish for both traditional and modern.
