Serve Corn Fried Shrimp For a Quick, Tasty Meal

CORN FRIED SHRIMP
2 pounds shrimp
1 1/2 cups self-rising corn meal
1 egg
1/2 cup milk
(If plain corn meal is used, add 3 teaspoons salt.)

Wash uncooked shrimp well, remove shell and black vein. Drain well, dip in self-rising corn meal, then in slightly beaten egg mixed with milk, and again in the corn meal. Fry in deep fat heated to 375°F, until golden brown, about 4 minutes. Serve with cocktail sauce. Yield: 6 to 8 servings.
