The next meeting will be the business meeting, which is held once a month.

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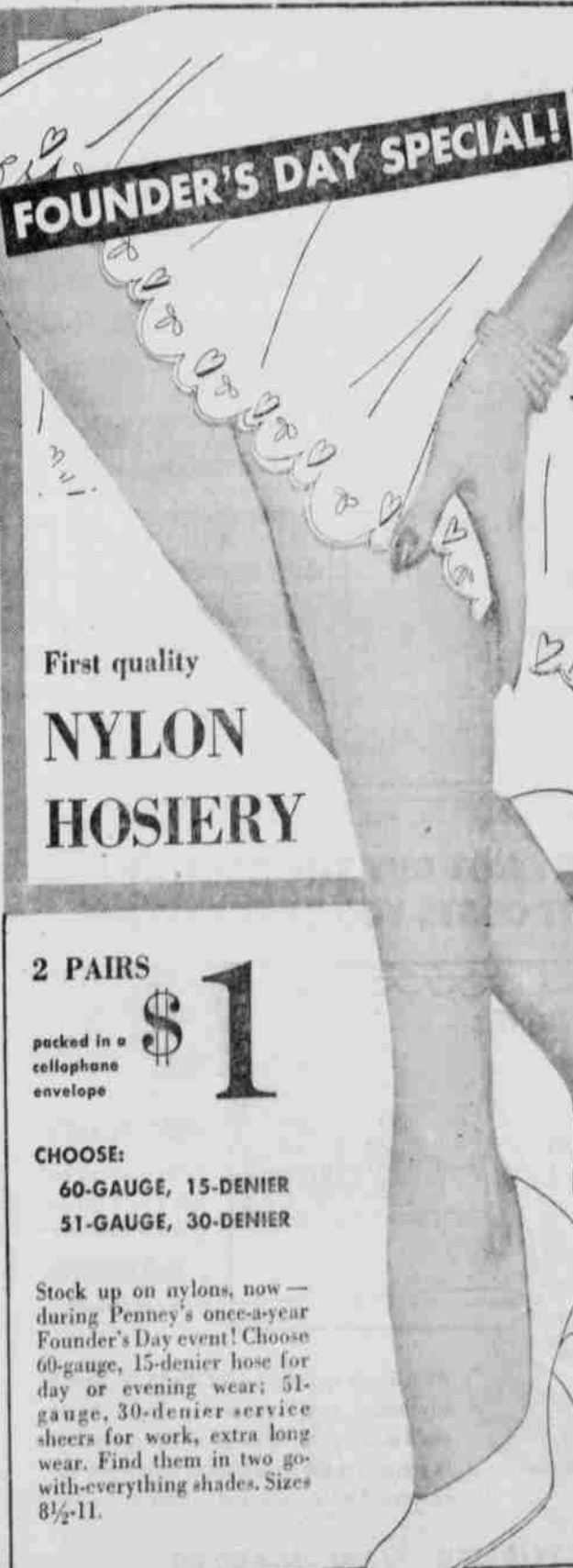


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
