LONG STATE SERVICE Charles E. Strickland, Oregon State Engineer, who died at Merced, California, from a heart attack was buried in Salem last Friday. State Engineer since 1930, Strickland had been with the state engineering office over a span of 42 years. He was born near Condon in 1884. Strickland represented Governor Earl Snell as a member of the Columbia Basin Inter-Agency Commission. He also served as an official of numerous state reclamation, sanitary, conservation and hydroelectric agencies. GERMAN OFFICIALS HERE The department of state is showing two high German officials many of the industrial plants of Oregon as a part of a Government Affairs Institute program. The tours started last week upon the arrival of Ermin Hohlwagler, Minister of Labor and Max Denker, Secretary General, S. D. P. for Baden-Wuerttemberg. Agricultural, political, scholastic and other varied activities also will be observed by the foreign visitors. BIGHORN SHEEP COMEBACK An attempt is being made by the Game Commission to restore Rimrock bighorn sheep, gone from the state 43 years. Twenty of the sheep provided by the British Columbia Game Department have been released on Hart Mountain in the rough desert country of South Central Oregon. The Commission will try to confine them in a 35-acre holding pen in Juniper Canyon until a 500-acre enclosure with a nine-foot fence can be completed. The bighorn is a different breed from the Rocky Mountain sheep. They can be distinguished by the sandy colored coat and low sweeping and tighter curled horns. SLATS OUGHTO KNOW "The great weakness in western states basketball is inability to hit long shots," Slats Gill, Oregon State college basketball coach, told Staters alumni group dinner in Salem this week. He said he would like to see Oregon prep coaches stress shooting from the "outside". He told the group there is no "Gill System" but just adjustments to available material. Power Companies Offer Funds For John Day Dam Plans A "no strings attached" offer to advance \$350,000 of planning funds to the U. S. Army Engineers in order that the corps can proceed immediately with necessary field exploration and preliminary design of the 1,100,000-kilowatt John Day dam project has been made by three Pacific Northwest electric utilities—Pacific Power & Light, Portland General Electric and Washington Water Power companies. Speaking for the group, Paul B. McKee, president of Pacific Power said that the offer was induced by the "grave concern" the three companies feel over the need to get new large projects started promptly to meet the power needs of the Pacific Northwest in the early 1960s. Efforts to secure John Day planning funds in the recent session of Congress were unsuccessful. Because survey and core drilling work could start during this winter's low water season on the Columbia river, the offer of the three companies to advance the needed money will gain approximately a year's time in starting actual construction of the project. The John Day project would dam the Columbia below Arlington, Oregon, in the remaining un-

developed stretch of the river between the recently-completed McNary dam and The Dalles dam, now under construction. The three companies would expect to get the funds they advanced returned to them if and when funds are appropriated by congress for the project, McKee said. The companies will not expect to receive interest on the advance and have so specified in the formal offer addressed to Colonel J. U. Moorhead, district engineer, Portland. The companies emphasized that the offer has no relationship to pending legislation in congress which, if ultimately passed, would authorize construction of John Day dam as a federal project but with local electric systems and industries financing the cost of power features, which are approximately half of the estimated \$325,000,000 cost of the project.

Livestock Sales Continue to Climb HERMISTON—Lowell Shattock of Boardman topped the market at the Hermiston livestock auction Friday with 4 whiteface cows selling for \$35.00 hd., Delbert Anson, manager of the sale, reports. Volume of cattle consigned rose substantially with many consignors bringing a few head of cattle each. Consigned were 679 head of cattle compared with 497 the previous Friday, 192 hogs compared with 213, and 110 sheep compared with 278. Quality was generally poorer but demand was broad and active, with Oregon and Washington packers and feeders well represented and area farmers seeking mainly stock cows and stock calves. The stock cows, generally being culled out by consignors, brought a top of \$135.00 per head, a drop of \$21.00 with nothing comparable to the

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
