

Many Awards Given To 4-H Leaders and Members at Parties

In observation of National 4-H Achievement day, Morrow county 4-H leaders and members, completing a successful club year were honored at Achievement parties, Friday and Saturday nights of last week. Parties were held for the North Morrow 4-H members and leaders at Boardman on Friday evening, the South Morrow 4-H members and leaders on Saturday evening, at Heppner.

Highlights of the two parties were the presentation of one tenth year leader and two tenth year member recognition pins. Mrs. L. A. McCabe of Ione, was honored for her ten years of leadership, while Mrs. Edna Grim, Irrigon, and Deane Graves of Heppner, were presented tenth year completion pins.

With approximately 400 people present at the two achievement parties, forty-six 4-H leaders and

217 members were recognized during the evening program. These members and leaders during the year carried out the 4-H principals of learning through doing in all of their activities. Leaders taught and members learned the importance of responsibilities and the reward of hard work through their projects in agriculture, homemaking and other subjects. Projects completed consisted of beef, dairy, sheep, swine, rabbits, and poultry, electric, cooking, sewing, homemaking, food preservation, and rose and flower. Ninety-two percent of the club members enrolled in the beginning of the year completed their projects.

Nine young ladies who promise to be future 4-H leaders were enrolled this year in a new project, that of junior leadership. These club members and junior leaders were honored with a presentation of the junior leadership pins, the first year that this project has been offered. Those who received junior leadership recognition for the year were Carla Hill and Nancy Graybeal of Irrigon, Maxine Sicard, Marie Potts and Carol Hamilton of Boardman; Patsy Wright, Sally Palmer, Jean Marie

Graham and Janet Kendall of Heppner. In their Junior leadership project, they undertook five different responsibilities in their club assisting the leader in completion.

Special awards were presented to those club members who during the year earned such recognition. Presented were Foley Food awards to Judy Howton, Mardine Baker, of Ione; Connie Anderson, Lucille Kendall, Janice Martin of Heppner; Vetamae Hill, Iris Strickley of Irrigon; and Maxine Sicard of Boardman. Safeway food preservation and preparation demonstration contest awards were presented to Jean Marie Graham and Helen Graham of Heppner. Janice Martin of Heppner was honored as high home economics individual judge at the Morrow County Fair and Rodeo, while Janet Wright won both the Spreckels canning and the special jam and jellies contest.

Samie Umiker and Janet Henderson of Irrigon, were winners of the Oregon Beekeepers Association special award. A medal was presented to Janet Kendall as dress revue winner and Sally Palmer was honored as grand champion in the county fair style revue. Patsy Wright of Heppner, was announced as Carl Raymond Gray College scholarship winner, while Russell Dolven of Lexington, was presented with the Safeway Stores breeding livestock summer school scholarship. Sally Palmer of Heppner and Bill Brannon of Ione were presented as the outstanding 4-H club members chosen for the Danforth Foundation awards.

Carlene Rhea, Lexington, Mardine Baker, Ione; Bill Brannon, Ione; and Marjorie Peck, Heppner, were presented as champion livestock showmen while Carlene Rhea was honored as the grand champion showman, Bill Brannon was presented with a plaque as the high livestock judge at the Morrow County Fair and Rodeo. State fair winners in clothing were presented to Patsy Wright, Janet Wright, Judy Thompson, Janice Martin, Sally Palmer and Sharon Hill of Heppner and Lynda Heimburger of Ione. Maxine Sicard, Boardman was presented with a summer school scholarship as winner in the state fair bread baking contest.

Power Company Pays Big Tax Bill

Morrow county's tax collections jumped \$13,888.14 Friday when Pacific Power & Light company's check in payment of its real property taxes for the year was turned in by J. R. Huffman, local manager.

Altogether, Huffman said, Pacific Power & Light paid property taxes totaling \$2,187,681.76 to 26 counties in Oregon in advance of the November 15 deadline.

This payment was \$207,546.85 larger than last year, an increase of 10.5 per cent.
