

Mill Head Wins National Award

NEW YORK, Nov. 8—C. W. Kraft, president of Heppner Lumber Co. and president of the Kraftite Company, Niles, California, was named this week as one of the three men in the United States who have contributed most to the American economy through the advancement of modular measure.

Announcement was made today by vice admiral George F. Hussey, Jr., managing director, American standards association. Admiral Hussey stated that Mr. Kraft will be presented an award at the ASA annual meeting session of the fifth national conference of standards, Nov. 15, Hotel Roosevelt, New York.

The recipients of the citations were recommended to the American Standards Association by a joint committee representing the National Association of Home Builders, the American Institute of Architects and the Producers' Council. Presentation will be made by M. Edwin Green of Lawrie and Green, Harrisburg, Pa., and chairman of committee A62 on coordination of dimensions of building materials and equipment, operating under the procedures of the American Standards Association.

Also chosen to receive the modular measure award are: Harold D. Hauf, head of the department of architecture, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute and C. E. Silling, architect, Charleston, West Virginia.

Modular measure is a system of coordinating the designer's dimensions for a building with the actual unit sizes of the materials of which it is to be constructed. This is accomplished by using the American standard 4-inch module as the least common denominator when setting up the dimensions of a building or when fixing the stock sizes of a building product.

The American Standards Association is the national clearing-house for voluntary engineering, industrial, safety and consumer standards. It is made up of 115 technical societies, trade associations, consumer groups, and 2300 individual company members. ASA is the United States member of the international organization of standardization.

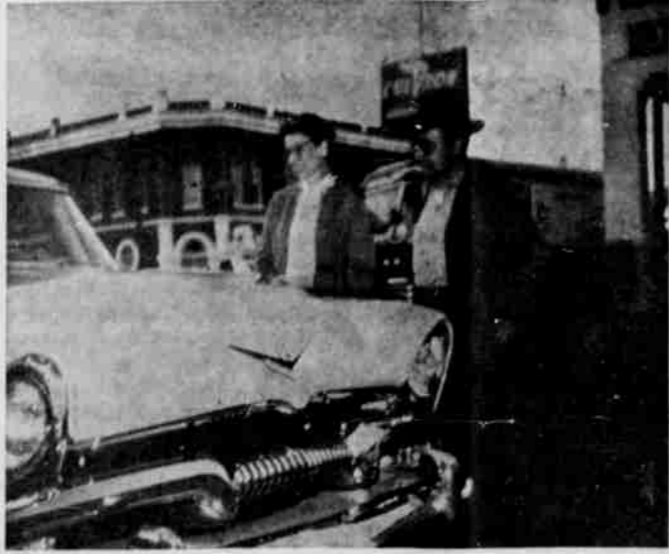

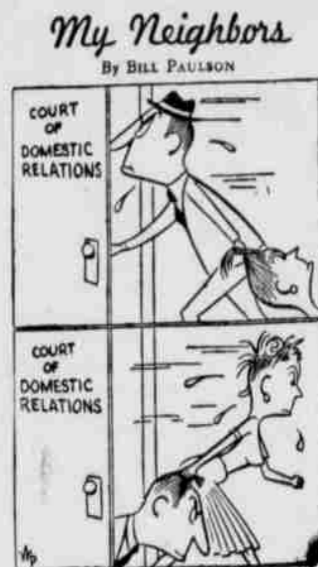
