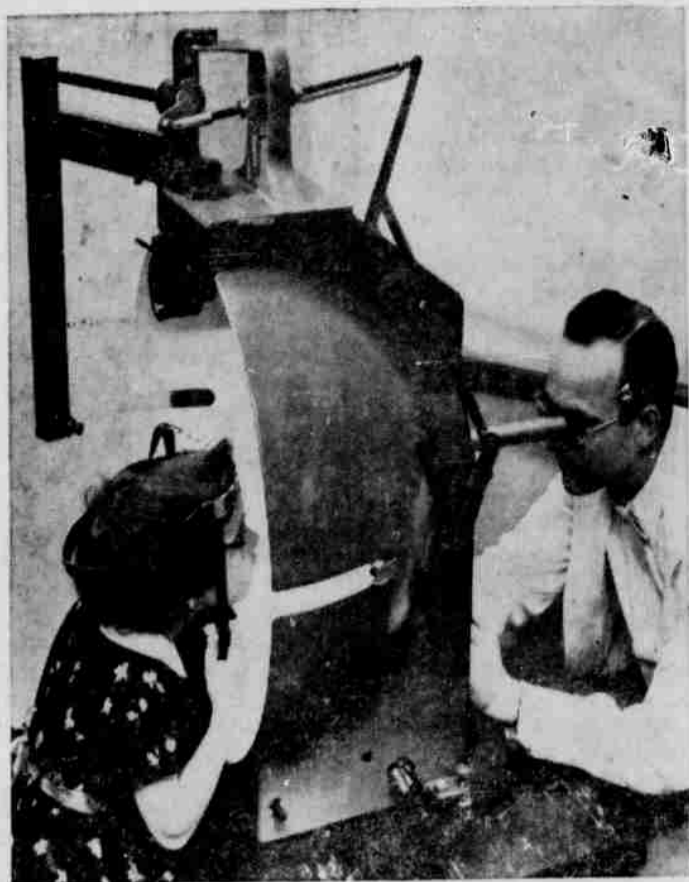


### Village Missions Youth Conference Held at Boardman
