Symbolic of General Motors' 50,000,000th car produced in the United States since 1908 is this 1955 Chevrolet Bel Air sport coupe. T. H. Keating, general manager of the Chevrolet Motor Division (left) is shown handing the key to the car to Harlow H. Curtice, president of General Motors. Behind Mr. Curtice is the design of GM's official 50,000,000th car medallion, emblematic of the greatest production record in transportation history. Painted and plated with gold, the car came off the Chevrolet assembly line at Flint, Michigan, on November 23. At that time GM celebrated with an "open house to America" in all of its 125 plants and training centers across the country.

Funeral services were held on Wednesday afternoon at the Christian church in Lexington for Laura Violet Scott, daughter of L. Palmer and Mary Shoff Palmer. She was born in Dennison, Iowa July 1 1864 and had eleven brothers and sisters. She and her parents came to Oregon when she was 14 years old and she was united in marriage to W. G. Scott in 1885 at Pendleton.

They came to Morrow county the same year and settled near the site of the present Cutsforth cabin on Willow Creek and it was she that planted the present poplar trees still standing near the cabin site 69 years ago. Later they moved to Blackhorse canyon to a ranch (the present Frank Moyer place) and later to Lexington in 1904. She resided in Lexington for the remainder of her life except for a few months spent at Hanby's nursing home in Hood River where she passed away at 90 years from infirmities of old age.

OSC Northwest Atlas Draw Wide Interest

OREGON STATE COLLEGE — Nearly 5000 copies of Oregon State college's "Atlas of Pacific Northwest" have been sold since the book was published a year ago.

The initial printing is almost exhausted and a second revised edition is planned.

The 130-page book, the joint work of 23 OSC staff members,

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presents a review of Pacific Northwest resources and industrial development. It has found wide use of a business and study reference throughout this country. Numerous requests have come also from other governments.

Edited by Dr. Richard M. Highsmith of the department of natural resources, the atlas covers forest resources and utilization, soil resources and land capability, electric power facilities, climate,

population, transportation, recreation, and trade and manufacturing.
