Suggested Milk Plans Reviewed By OSC Worker

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Oregon dairymen, faced with the perplexing problems of "where do we go from here?" since the recent repeal of the state milk marketing act are discussing four possible plans to stabilize their markets, says Oscar Hagg, extension dairymarketing specialist at Oregon State college.

The specialist lists a federal milk marketing order as one of the plans receiving much publicity at present. Under such a set-up, minimum prices would be set on milk at the producer's level with provision for change as economic conditions require. Payments for milk would be pooled and paid out to individual farmers on the basis of a uniform or average price.

The federal order is designed assure farmers of steady, dependable markets and prices for their milk, and assure consumers of an adequate supply, Hagg explains.

An alternative plan to the federal order and one that has already gained support in some counties, according to the specialist, is a new state milk marketing act. This act would set minimum prices at the producer's level, may or may not have some sort of production quotas, and pooling—either market-wide or on an individual distributors basis—would be provided for payment to farmers.

A combination of a federal milk marketing order and new state milk marketing act is another possible plan being discussed by dairymen, the specialist continues. One such proposal suggests calls for a federal order for the Portland milkshed area, including southwestern Washington, and state marketing orders for other parts of Oregon.

A similar plan is being used in New York state in which New York City is under a federal milk marketing order and the remainder of the state is covered by the state law.

The setting-up of producer's marketing associations are an area or statewide basis is the fourth possible plan. Producers would voluntarily agree to use their combined milk production in bargaining with milk handlers to maintain stable prices, Hagg says.

Cattle Sales Trend Upward

HERMISTON—Volume of cattle consigned at the Hermiston livestock auction, Friday rose sharply after the post-holiday drop. Delbert Anson, manager of the sale, reports.

Consigned were 647 cattle compared with 364 the previous Friday, 163 hogs compared with 56, and 180 sheep compared with 26. Demand was broad and very active, prices generally stronger.
