

Work Started On New Boardman Cutoff Road

County Judge Garnet Barratt and commissioners Ralph Thompson, Heppner, and Russell Miller, Boardman, were on the project last Friday, accompanied by A. F. Parsons, division engineer of the Oregon State Highway, and Earl Bickmore, from La Grande, and C. C. McKinney, resident engineer from Hermiston, to inspect the roads that are to be graded and oiled. The county crew will be here to start the grading soon, and the oiling will be done in the spring. Grading was started on Dec. 1 on the new cutoff road from here to Heppner across the desert east of the bombing range. The road starts at about the 167 mile post on highway 30 and will connect with highway 207 at the North Lexington grain elevator. This road will shorten the distance from here to Heppner by 19 miles, making it a distance of 43 miles, which will mean a great deal to residents of this end of the county.

Hayes Grocery, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Walter Hayes, reopened last Saturday, after being remodeled following the fire that destroyed their store five and a half weeks before. The store has a new front and new furnishings inside. Frank Delvail, Pendleton contractor, did the remodeling.

Cars driven by Mrs. Zoe Billings and Clyde Tannehill, rural mail carrier, collided at an intersection of two project roads about two miles southeast of town and a mile south of highway 30 last Saturday morning. How To Candy Pineapple



What fun... what a saving... what feeling of accomplishment... and, on top of that, how easy it is to make your Candied Pineapple from canned pineapple. You'll use it in candies, cookies, cakes, and puddings during the holidays. But, by all means, be sure to save some to serve as a superfine confection just as it is.

Candied Pineapple

1 can (1 lb. 4 oz.) sliced pineapple
1 1/2 cups granulated sugar
Confectioners (powdered) sugar

Drain syrup from pineapple thoroughly. (Allow to drain in a colander several minutes.) Cover bottom and top of slices with the granulated sugar; store about 24 hours at room temperature. Empty into large skillet and boil 5 minutes; reduce heat and simmer 15 minutes. Turn occasionally during the cooking, taking care that it does not scorch or turn brown. Remove slices to a wire rack to dry about 24 hours. Pat sides and edges of slices heavily with sifted confectioners sugar. A crusty glaze will form after standing on the wire rack overnight. To retain crusty glaze, store in loosely covered container.

NOTE: If surface is not dry after standing, reroll in confectioners sugar.
