The new mayor told the council and visitors in an acceptance speech that she would do everything in her power to make Hepp ner the best place in the world in which to live. She said, "I am not going to be pushed around but will temper justice with mercy." She continued that she would be fussy about house keeping in Heppner and asked for the council to work together as a team, and for better cooperation among the council, the county government and the chamber of commerce to map a plan which will be beneficial to the county as a whole. She also asked for a definite plan of numbering all houses in town and a project of street naming, and suggested a citizens committee that could, over a period of one or two years. work out a new city charter that would be more up to date than the present one which was accepted in 1918.

Offices Combined

Mrs. Stevens also asked the ouncil to consider her suggestion that the two present part-time positions of city recorder and city water clerk be combined into one full-time job, stating that she felt the city would benefit from a more efficient operation of its business. It would also make it possible to keep the city hall office open to the public during the entire day.

The council later considered the request and passed it unanimously, abolishing the office of water clerk which is held by Mrs. Charles Comillion. City recorder Ted Smith will take over her duties in 30 days.
