New Highs Set By Cattle Prices

HERMISTON—Three Heppner men received top prices at the Hermiston livestock auction Friday, Delbert Anson, manager of the sale, reports. They were Claude White, 1 whiteface heifer calf, 405 lbs., \$19.50 cwt.; Harold Wright, 1 black sow, 225 lbs., \$15.90 cwt.; and Harold Peck, 1 buck, 190 lbs., \$7.25 cwt.

Three new highs were set Friday. Feeder steers had brought the highest price in six months the previous Friday, \$20.10 cwt., and 10 whiteface shorted steers weighing 11,195 lbs., were sold Friday by M. F. Umbarger, Pendleton, at \$20.40 cwt. A new top was registered when \$20.80 cwt was paid E. P. Snyder of Hermiston for 70 steer calves weighing 31,100 lbs., up 70c over the last sale. And P. J. Quinn of Stanfield received \$15.80 cwt for a Holstein bull weighing 2125 lbs., highest price paid this season.

Calves and steers predominated at the sale Friday with Oregon, Washington and Idaho packers and feeders and Oregon and Washington farmers contributing to broad, active demand at a brisk sale. Consigned were 442 cattle compared with 465 the previous Friday, 132 hogs compared with 272, and 221 sheep compared with 8.

In line with other markets the hog market regained strength, fat hogs up \$1 at 20.10 cwt.; and higher prices elsewhere and better quality accounted for the \$15.80 top on bulls, up \$1.60 cwt. Stocker steers were up \$1.75 at \$18.60 cwt.

Needed at the sale next Friday are more grain fed steers and heifers and feeder steers. Calves: Baby calves 4.50-19.00 hd.; weaner calves, steer calves 19.20-20.80 cwt.; heifer calves 16.10-17.60; veal 19.20-22.10.

Steers: Stocker steers 17.10-18.60 cwt.; feeder steers 18.60-20.40; fat slaughter steers 20.40-21.70; fat heifers 16.35-18.70. Cows: Dairy cows \$7.50-132.50 hd.; dairy heifers 11.75-13.60 cwt.; no stock cows.

Slaughter cows: Commercial 12.85-15.10 cwt.; utility 11.20-12.35; canner-cutter 8.50-10.10; shells 6-10-7.70.

Animal Nutrition Meetings Planned Feb. 3-4 at OSC

Forecasts of ample feed supplies for Oregon's 1955 barnyard cafeteria still leave a string of unanswered questions on how the diet should be balanced for most efficient livestock and poultry production.

Latest research findings in feeds and feeding will be reported to Oregon feed and seed dealers at the 13th annual Animal Nutrition conference, February 3 and 4, at Oregon State college. Lorin E. Harris, Utah State Agricultural college, heads a list of nationally-known feed experts who will address the conference. Recent winner of two major national awards for his nutrition work, Harris will speak the opening day on supplementary feed-

ing of range livestock. On the second day, he will tell how to use urea protein supplement in cattle feeding.

E. P. Singen, University of Connecticut, will report new scientific trends in poultry rations and George S. Templeton, national authority on rabbit production, will discuss rabbit feeding and commercial production of rabbit meat. For the past 20 years, Templeton has directed the U. S. department of agriculture's rabbit experiment station at Fontana, Cal., focal point of the nation's rabbit industry.

Use of minerals in livestock and poultry feed is scheduled for discussion by three Oregon State college researchers. They are H. G. Arcott, poultry department; I. R. Jones, dairy; and J. E. Oldfield, animal husbandry. Oldfield will also suggest ways of balancing local feedstuffs for swine production in Oregon.

P. M. Brandt, OSC dairy department head, will review the OSC dairy research program, and J. A. Harper, poultry department, will report turkey research. Harper will also appear with Singen, Harris and Templeton on a panel to answer questions from the audience at the close of the conference.

Other OSC speakers are G. Burton Wood, agricultural economics department head; Roger Sproles, dairy department; and E. M. Dickinson, poultry department. All sessions will be in Withcombe hall with registration starting February 3 at 9 a. m.

Power Failure Woes With Home Freezers Reviewed by Experts

Brief power failures caused by winter storms needn't bring worries about food keeping in a home freezer. Mary Beth Minden, Oregon State college extension home management specialist, said food will keep easily in a closed freezer if it is without electricity only a few hours.

With the freezer closed, food usually will stay frozen in a fully loaded cabinet two days, she said. In a cabinet with less than half a load, it will not keep frozen more than a day. But spoilage will not start for at least three days.

During a power cut-off, the only three reasons for opening the freezer are to put in dry ice, to remove frozen food to a locker plant, or to take out food needed in the emergency. Opening the freezer to see if food is getting soft will only spread its thawing, she cautioned.

Locating the nearest place that sells dry ice is a wise precaution, she explained. Many dairies or cold storage warehouses have it. Put in the home freezer, it will

keep food frozen. Miss Minden also suggests locating the nearest locker plant and learning whether frozen food can be rushed there if necessary for safekeeping.

The weather forecast may be a cue for adjusting the freezer's temperature. In areas where heavy storms may affect power lines and cause shut-offs, it may be wise to get the freezer contents as cold as possible, Miss Minden said.

The colder the food, the longer it will stay frozen without electricity, according to the home management specialist. So in areas where power lines are often affected by sleet, high winds or silver thaws, she suggests setting the freezer's temperature control at its coldest position when power trouble threatens.

Further information on what to do when the home freezer stops is available from county home extension agents.
