Response Good at Special Sheep Sale

HERMISTON—L. M. Marlott of Hepner received the top price of \$12 cwt. for six wethers weighing 630 lbs. at the Hermiston livestock auction Friday. Delbert Anson, manager of the sale, reports.

Excellent response to the first special sheep sale of the summer at the regular weekly livestock auction is reported by Anson. Consigned were 269 sheep compared with 96 the previous Friday. Another special sheep sale along with the regular sale will be held July 22.

Volume of cattle consigned jumped sharply Friday, 527 head compared with 339 the previous

Friday. Also consigned were 135 hogs compared with 153. Oregon and Washington packers, feeders, and farmers contributed to active demand in all lines of cattle. Feeder steers were steady, quality considered, with more steers selling at the higher end of the price range, with a top of \$20.40 cwt. Better quality slaughter cows brought more, commercial up \$1.10 at \$15.20 cwt., utility up 35c at \$12.85 cwt., canner-cutter up 10c at \$9.70. Steer calves were up 10c at \$21.30 cwt., and veal was up 20c at \$22.20 cwt. Fat hogs were up \$1 at \$22.20 cwt., in contrast to the Chicago market, and sows were up \$1.60 at \$15.70 cwt., boars up 65c at \$7.75 cwt. Most feeder lambs, in strong demand, sold from \$15.20 to a top of \$15.80 cwt., up 60c. Most sheep consigned were from small farm flocks and most cattle were in small lots.

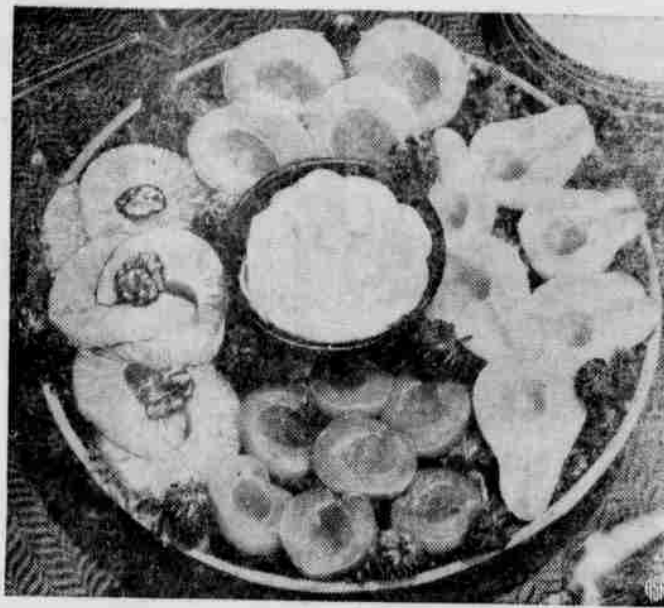

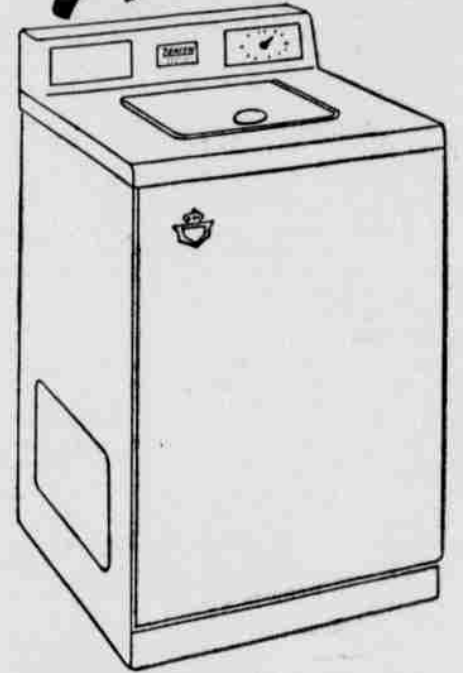
