# 38,000 Acres of Bombing Range to Be Released Soon

The county court revealed this week that arrangements are now being made by the real estate division of the Army Engineers to release approximately 38,000 acres of the Boardman bombing range for private use under a permit or lease plan.

The land, a strip five by 12 miles along the south end of the 94,000 acre bombing range, is expected to be released by the engineers sometime this fall after the area has been decontaminated, cleaned of all old shells, bomb fragments etc. According to reports, the land will be released only on temporary permit which can be revoked at any time the army determines it again needs the area. Under the presently announced plan, the land will not be sold or go back on the tax rolls as some stories had indicated.

Most of the area is usable only for rande land. What the permit requirements will be has not yet been announced.

Special surveys in farm areas indicate that about three out of every four accidents to farm residents are the result of one or more unsafe acts, says Ned H. Dearborn, president of the National Safety Council.

"Regardless of national and group safety activities, the ultimate responsibility for each farm resident's safety is himself, Dearborn continues.
