The Columbia River for navigation, irrigation, flood control and power production. The dam will provide 1,105,000 kilowatts of power. It will make possible slack water navigation for 320 miles up the Columbia River, and

"H. R. 5789 PROVIDES a way to cope successfully with these two national problems I have just outlined. To quote the New York Times, 'This bill lets the Federal Government have its cake and eat it too.' We in the Pacific Northwest know that it

it will have valuable flood control benefits.

"THIS LEGISLATION was drafted as an answer to two of the most serious problems which face the Members of this Congress. The first is the problem of money and taxes, and the second is the tremendous increase in the demand for electric power—both in my region and the entire United States. . . .

"THIS POSSIBILITY of a critical power shortage in the Pacific Northwest however, may not be as well known by some members of the committee as it is to those of us who live in the area. The last few decades has seen a period of remarkable industrial growth in the Pacific Northwest. Many of these new industries depend on hydro-electric power. We are fortunate in that we have nearly half of the hydro-electric potential in the entire United States. But in spite of this we are faced with a power shortage because so much of this potential is still not developed. This shortage in the early 1960's is forecast by the Pacific Northwest Governors Power Policy Committee in its report of this year. Such a shortage would be a major disaster to our part of the country as it would close down some of these industries upon which a large part of our economy now depends. In view of the billions of dollars which we are annually sending to foreign nations to save their economic life, it is unnecessary for me to point out that a sound economy in the Pacific Northwest is vital to a sound economy in the rest of our nation. A Pacific Northwest power shortage in the 1960's would have an adverse national effect.

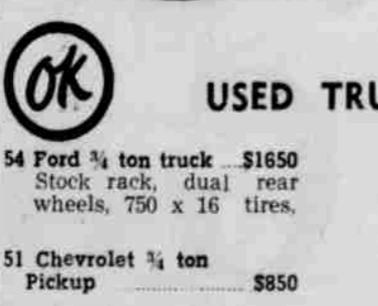
