

Dairy Cattle Sell At Special Sale

HERMISTON—Over 100 head of dairy cattle, mostly heifers, were sold at the special dairy cow sale held along with the regular weekly sale at the Hermiston livestock auction Friday. Delbert Anson, manager of the sale, reports. Dairy cows brought a top of \$177.50 hd., up \$40 from the

previous week, and dairy heifers brought a top of \$13.50 cwt., up 60c, for mostly 500 to 700 pound heifers.

Consigned Friday were 281 cattle compared with 424 the previous Friday, 217 hogs compared with 176, and 76 sheep compared with 233 the previous Friday at

the special sheep sale. Another special sheep sale will be held next Friday, Aug. 5, with feeder and fat lambs particularly in demand.

Consignments were mostly odds and ends as farmers were busy with second haying and combining, and quality was only mediocre, but demand was good. Bulls were up 40c at a top of \$15 cwt. Feeder pigs were steady. Hogs broke along with other markets but top was \$18 cwt. while Chicago top was \$17. Feeder lambs were up 75c at \$15.60 cwt., and ewes up \$2.90 at \$5.70 cwt.

Hogs: Weaner pigs 8.50-12.00 hd.; feeder pigs 16.60-18.40 cwt.; fat hogs 16.90-18.00 cwt.; sows, heavy only, 10.90-12.80 cwt.; no boars.

Sheep: Feeder lambs 12.50-15.60 cwt.; ewes 2.25-5.70 cwt.; no fat lambs or bucks.

Ione Navy Radarmen On European Cruise

NORFOLK, VA.—Claude J. Pettyjohn, radarmen first class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Pettyjohn of Ione, aboard the tactical command ship USS Northampton is participating in the first of three annual Midshipmen training courses scheduled for the summer months.

Twenty ships of the Atlantic fleet departed here June 6 enroute to Europe with more than 3,000 Midshipmen from the Naval Academy and NROTC students from 23 colleges and universities.

The ships' crews will train the future Naval officers in navigation, gunnery, seamanship, engineering, communications, and other phases of seagoing operations.

They will visit ports in England and Spain. Gunnery practice at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, will climax the cruise before returning here August 2.
