All teachers are returning, with the exception of one, and Mrs. Freda Thayer, Lyons, has been hired to teach English, girls physical education and journalism. Mrs. Thayer has had several years of experience, having received her Bachelor's degree from U. of O., and her Master's degree from O. S. C. Other teachers are Anderson, teaching typing, business law and Business mathematics; Ronald Black, vocational agriculture and mathematics; Marion Morlan, band, boys' physical education and science; Sid Cloud, American Problems, world geography, biology, Latin and library; seventh and eighth grade, Mrs. John Blackburn; fifth and sixth, Mrs. Roy Partlow; third and fourth, Mrs. Harold Baker; second, Mrs. John Partlow; first, Mrs. Zoe Billings, who will also do remedial teaching in the elementary grades. The cafeteria has recently been completely remodeled to meet the standards of the state de-

partment of health. A new electric range has been installed, new work benches and shelves, windows replaced with glass brick, and two exhaust fans installed. Grease proof linoleum has been put in the kitchen and asphalt tile in the dining room. New fluorescent lighting has also been put in the kitchen.

40 new 60-inch lockers have been purchased for the high school, and Bradley wash fountains have been installed in the rest rooms. Other improvements include chair racks for the gymnasium and permanent steel goal posts on the football field.
