Twenty one members were present.

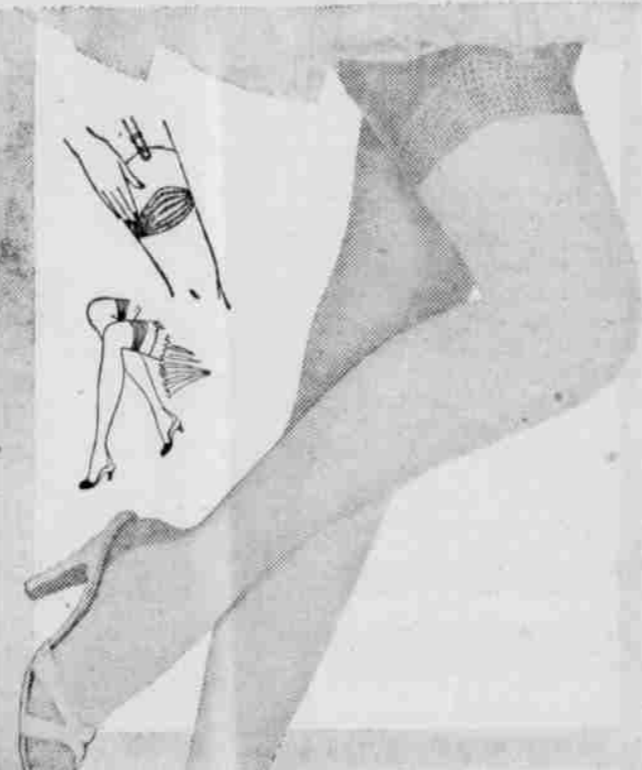

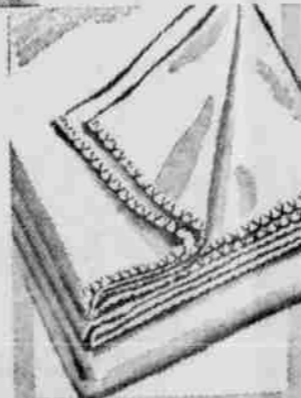
