Mr. and Mrs. Alonzo Henderson and family have returned from a trip to Northern California, the Oregon Caves, and Crater Lake.

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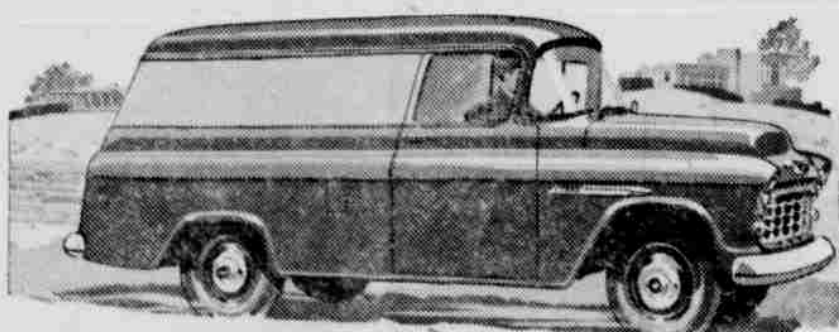
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
