

Mustangs Open Grid Season Today At Pilot Rock

Thursday afternoon gets coach Jim Mallon's Mustangs off to a flying start as they venture to Pilot Rock for their initial game of the season. Out to better their last year's record which achieved only 1 win, 3 ties, and 4 losses, the Mustangs will meet the buzzing Rockets as a slight underdog, for the Pilot Rock gridders have a 14-12 victory over Elgin under their belts already.

Primarily, the Rockets are a ground team; but they did use the air for one touchdown last week. Their big power lies in their fullback, ends, and tackles as they are all veterans of three to four years.

To sum up the score on an even-stein basis the horses will put Burke Gentry and Vic Grosshens at ends, Jim Morris and Ed Brosnan will hold down tackle spots, Mike Monahan will be placed at right guard, while Steve Green and Fred Lynch will fight it out for left guard position. Jerry Dougherty switches from fullback to take over the center's chores. In the backfield, Lance Tibbles will engineer the attack from quarterback spot while Ron McCabe and Skip Ruhl will run as halfbacks. Barrelling through as fullback will be Dick Ruhl, an up-and-coming freshman, who has taken over his duties like a veteran.

Depended upon to stop the Rockets' ground strength will be Dean Connor, Len Schwartz, Al Esch, Steve Green, as well as the greater part of the offensive team.

Due to see plenty of action will be Delbert Piper, Kay Corbin, Jim Monahan, Fred Lynch, Duane Alderman, and Jim Walker.

Kicking off will be Skip Ruhl while point after touchdown duties will be tended to by Jerry Dougherty.

Tum-A-Lum Lumber company has donated the outstanding linemen award which any football player on the team is eligible to receive. The most valuable backfield plaque is being given by Rosewall Motor Company.

In response to the Mustangs' plea for players the blue and gold horses now have 25 men out. Out of this addition to the lineup coach Jim Mallon has found several linemen and a couple of promising backs.

The game after next finds the Mustangs encountering the Ione Cardinals at which time sport spectators should see a well-played game.

Soil District To Buy Boundary Signs
