Mrs. Floyd Jones entertained the Bookworms on Tuesday evening October 11.

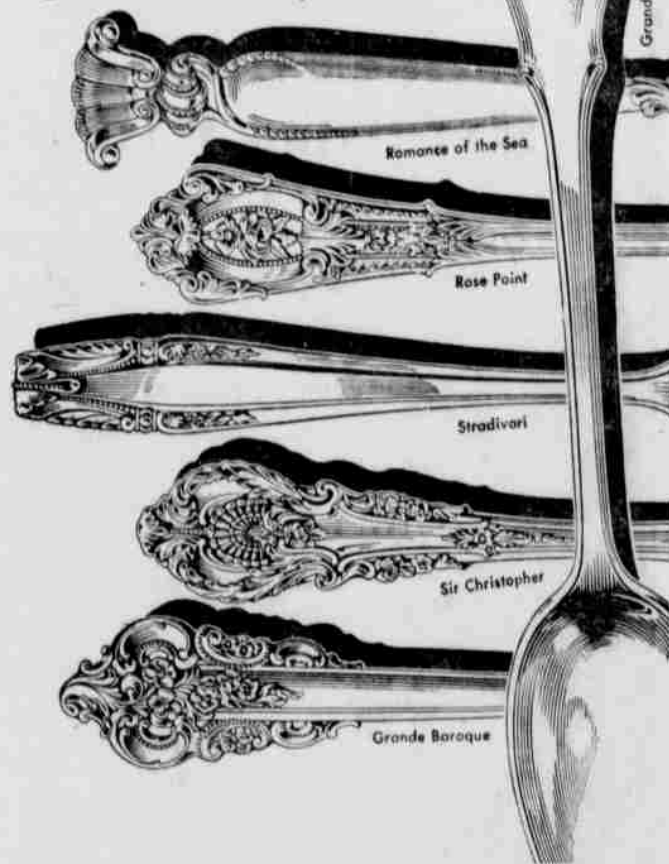

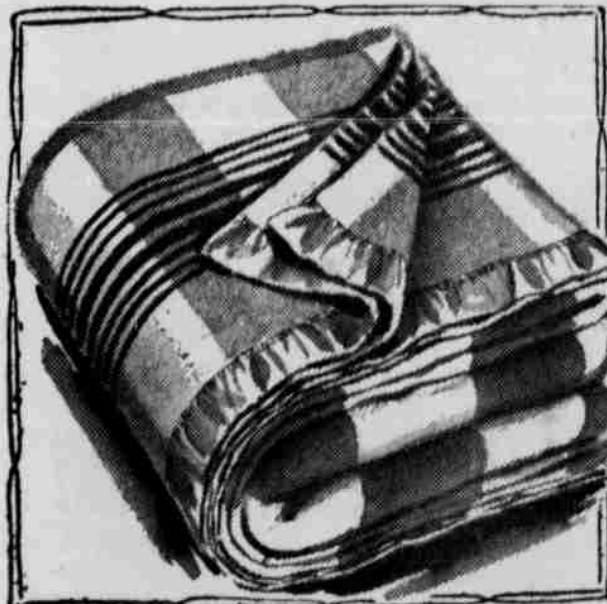
