state engineer at Salem.
The Oregon State College farm building plan service has recent-

ly revised its lists of plans available for farm buildings. There are several good corral layout plans as well as other buildings and facilities. The list is available from this office. There is a brief description of most plans, indicating the size and type of construction. Detailed plans, as blueprints, are available at a small cost to cover printing and mailing costs.

Oregon is second in the nation in land sprinkler irrigated. California is first with 181,000 acres, Oregon is second with 98,000 acres, Washington is third with 67,000 acres. These three states, in 1950 had more than half the sprinkler irrigated land in the United States.

FUTURE LOG SUPPLY
During the recent conferences with Gov. Patterson on Oregon timber use Secretary of the Interior McKay said that the recent increase of 10 per cent in allowable cut of O. & C. timber is not a final decision. The department intends to speed a reinventory of forest lands with a view to establishing an annual allowable cut based upon up-to-date inventory, special utilization and modern timber management practices.

McKay emphasized that the Department of the Interior has been working on this question for a long time.

An agreement has been worked out between the Bureau of Land Management and the 18 Oregon and California land counties, providing that 25 per cent of the counties' receipts from O. & C. income is to be made available for the construction of access roads and reforestation. Efforts and plans are being made to obtain additional money totaling \$400,000 to provide for additional timber sales.

A request for \$1,300,000 more than at present for reinventory of B. L. M. stands, growth and regeneration studies will be asked for.

WATER POLICY ADOPTED
The annual meeting of the National Reclamation Association in Lincoln, Nebraska, October 24-26 was attended by delegates representing seven western states and national figures interested in reclamation, for a total attendance of over 600 persons. Jason Lee, Salem attorney who represented Oregon on the resolutions committee, reports that two of the principal resolutions adopted were a national water policy and a basin accounting system for the use of power revenues to aid in underwriting reclamation projects.
The 1956 N. R. A. convention, the 25th annual meeting, will be held in Salt Lake City, the city

of the N. R. A.'s birth in 1931 when Oregon's Governor Julius L. Meier was one of the principal promoters in organizing the water policy reclamation group.

WHEAT MEASURES
A change of wheat measuring from the bushel to the hundred-weight, and improvements in standards of grading were advised by Floyd Root, The Dalles, chairman of the field crop committee for the Oregon Farm Bureau Federation, at a meeting of directors at Salem last Friday and Saturday.

Executive Secretary George Dewey reported that the O. F. B. F. has grown a membership of more than 600 families during the past year. There are now 7653 members compared with 7036 one year ago.

The annual meeting will be held in Salem November 13-16.
