MORE PAYROLLS Predictions were made this week by State Unemployment Commission that Oregon's payrolls covered by the unemployment law will break all records in 1955.

Approximately 18,000 employees reported payment of wages for the first six months of 1955 at \$648,296,330, an increase of \$42,000,000 over the same period a year ago and \$26,000,000 more than the previous high of \$622,296,335 in the first half of 1953.

If this rate maintains, officials said this year's payrolls will reach \$1,350,000,000 against the top of \$1,298,380,028 two years ago. Tabulation of second quarter payrolls showed \$340,517,697. This is the highest for any three months in the history of the commission, except for the third quarter of 1953.

The summer period just passed was expected to set a new all-time record, officials reasoned.

MORE CARS There will be a car for every person in Oregon in 1969 if the number of motor vehicle registrations increase at the present tempo and the population increases only normally. The increase during the past 12 months was almost 7 per cent.

The processing of registrations and titles in the motor vehicle department is necessarily tedious

and time consuming, because of research and cross-filing; however, figures for the first nine months of 1955 were available for totalization Monday. Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry revealed there were 657,773 motor vehicle registrations processed in his office during the first nine months of this year as compared with 614,096 during the January 1-September 30 period in 1954.

Newbry's report also showed his office issued 47,290 new drivers licenses and 35,488 instruction permits during the nine months tabulated.

MORE HOSPITALS The Oregon State Board of Health meeting in Salem this week approved a federal grant of \$563,000 for a proposed 78-bed hospital at Medford.

The approval is tantamount to a grant of the Hill-Burton act funds. The state would match the federal funds and the balance would be raised locally in southern Oregon.

Other projects approved for federal aid were \$12,030 to complete an addition to Holliday Park hospital in Portland; \$6,833 for an addition to Blue Mountain general hospital in Prairie City, and \$175,000 to remodel and enlarge Hood River Memorial hospital.

Federal funds approved will be available during the current fiscal year.
