The next meeting will be held at the home of Elwyn Hughes on Sunday, Jan. 8 at 2 p. m. Donald Hughes, reporter

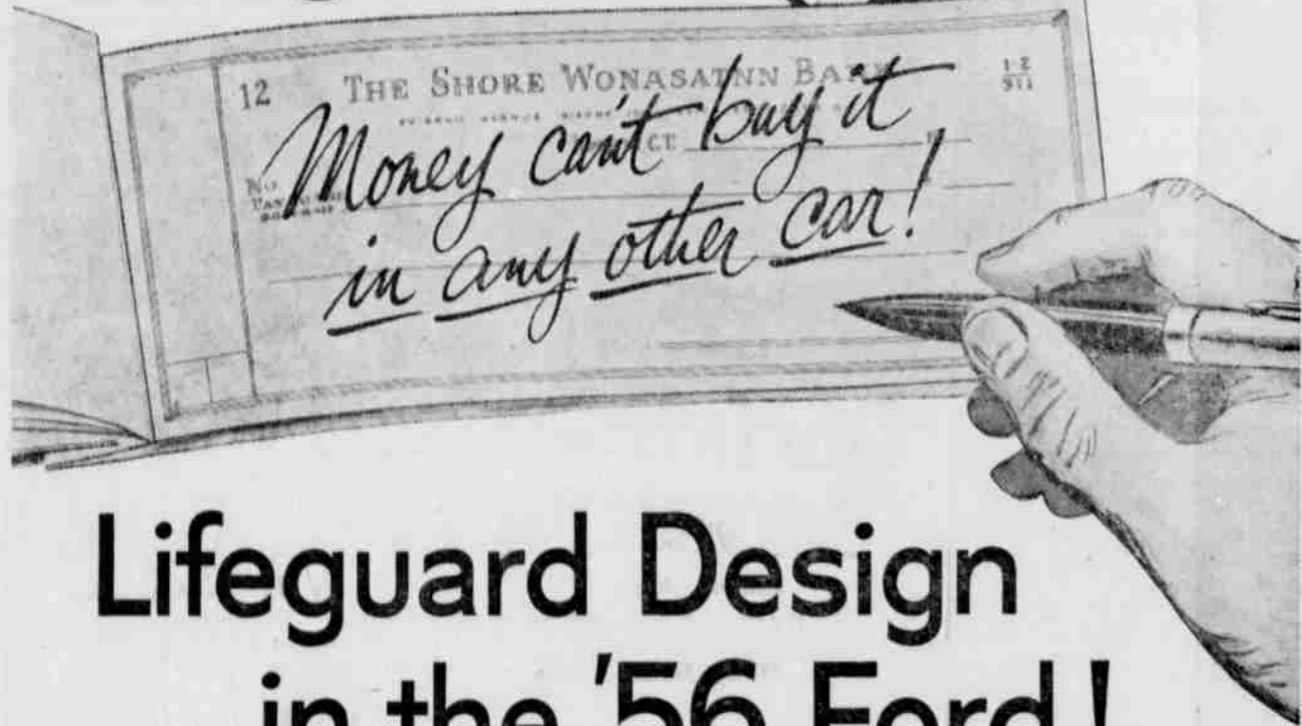
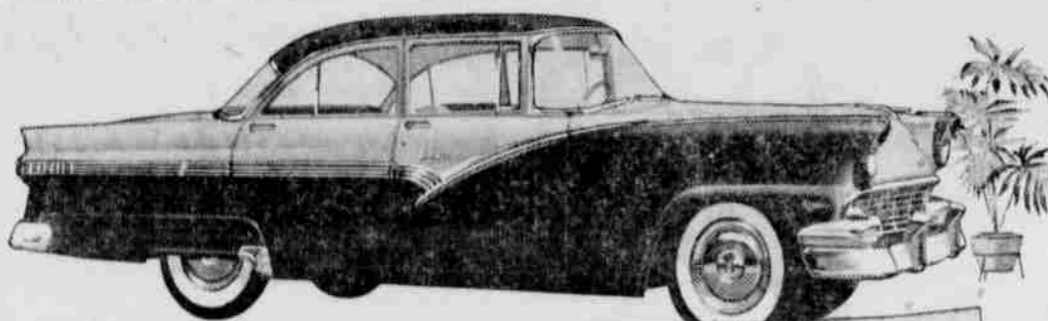
