Christmas decorations were used throughout the room and on the tables and Jimmy Schaffitz helped Santa Claus in distributing the gifts.

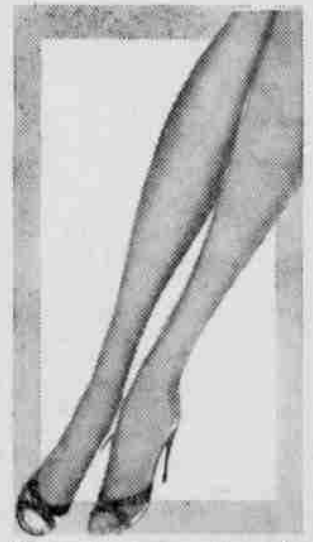

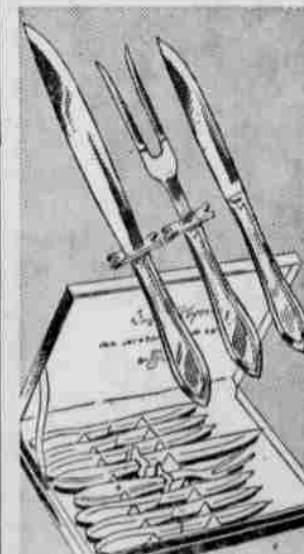
