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WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" By C. WILSON HARDER

Of late, many readers ask purpose behind current drive being conducted by field force of National Federation of Independent Business.

They are referring to vigorously promoted "Trade Independent" campaign.



Neither is it sufficient to merely state local independent retailers supply a large share of nation's employment, or that they make heavy contributions both in form of taxes and donations to civic improvement and betterment.

For there is far greater import. Without a successful and large corps of independent retailers across the nation, progress would stagnate, and this stagnation would back up to the payrolls of independent manufacturers and packers.

In fact, there would be little new pioneered in market place unless this corps of independent retailers were available.

As anyone who has attempted to market a new brand or product knows, huge multi-unit retail operations are the last to take on the item or brand.

Many sales executives working on a new item or brand have often heard some headquarters buyer say "Well, if there is a demand for this product, or we have calls for it, we will discuss it. But we are not engaged in pioneering anything."

This could well become the shopping slogan of today.

"If you are looking for value, see your independent merchant first."

Thus, classic strategy is to interest independent retail outlets to give item a try. Naturally, if successful in independent outlets, big multi-unit operations either then take on item, or as happens in many cases, tries to duplicate in their own wholly owned manufacturing subsidiaries.

Obviously, this is but natural, as it is human instinct to play it safe. Thus, when a buyer, who is merely an employee in a big organization, is confronted with a new item, his safest course is to turn it down rather than run the risk of censure over exercising bad judgment. On other hand, the independent retailer, who has only himself to answer to, is willing to back his judgment with his money.

Thus, independent retailers make a great and lasting contribution to the American system. It is probably this fact which accounts in the heaviest way for fact that while American consumer has a wealth of goods to choose from, Ivan in Russia has very little to choose from, and that usually of inferior quality.

In fact, it could even be said most factory jobs, most farm welfare, depends today upon independent retailer.

Therefore, it is hope of this promotion that many thinking people, in market for any item, will drop first into independent retailers in their area and compare quality for quality, service for service, price for price.

For one of the amazing things about entire American economy is great wealth of goods offered at reasonable prices today throughout the land.

This could well become the shopping slogan of today.

"If you are looking for value, see your independent merchant first."

Beef cattle handling equipment on farms need not be expensive, according to a new Oregon State college bulletin that includes building plans for everything from spray corrals to molasses feeders.

The bulletin, "Beef Cattle Equipment", was prepared by OSC extension specialists in agricultural engineering and animal husbandry. Copies are available from county extension agents or OSC bulletin clerk.

Well-planned corrals and other devices make handling of cattle easier, save labor, and most of all, cut shrinkage to a minimum, the specialists state. The bulletin includes a list of detailed plans available through the Oregon farm building plan service at OSC—cattle feeding shelter, wood or reinforced concrete cattle guard, squeeze chute, hoof trimming stock, salt box, and self-feeders for chopped hay, grain, and meal and mineral.

Also included in the booklet are tables showing required floor areas for all types of beef animals, feed requirements for the breeding of cows and weaners, recommended storage capacity for various feeds, and dimensions for feeding equipment.

Illustrated arrangements for corrals and chutes can be applied in principle to any size operation.

They provide facilities for branding, dehorning, loading and unloading, separating or cutting, weighing, spraying and holding.

The bulletin discusses installation of a set of scales which the specialists say are necessary to anyone in the livestock business, not only for buying and selling cattle, but as a key instrument in livestock improvement programs to measure rates of gains in feeding and breeding projects.

Portable shelters, pole frame combination feed and cattle shelters are among other facilities included in the bulletin. Illustrations were gathered from experiment stations in California, Oklahoma, Montana, and OSC, the American Hereford association.
