APPLE RAISIN FRITTERS

1 1/2 cups sifted enriched flour, 1 tablespoon sugar, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 egg, beaten, 1/2 cup milk, 1 tablespoon melted shortening, 1/2 cups chopped apples, 1/2 cup seedless raisins, fat for deep frying. Sift together flour, baking powder, salt, sugar, and cinnamon. Combine eggs, milk, and shortening. Add apples and raisins to liquid mixture. Add to flour mixture, stirring until flour is well moistened. Drop by spoonfuls into deep hot fat (375 degrees F.) and fry until brown, turning frequently. Drain on absorbent paper. Serve with sirup and pork sausage. Makes about 18 small fritters.
