NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS Sealed proposals for the construction of a reinforced concrete foot bridge will be received by the City of Heppner, Morrow County, Oregon until 8 p. m., P. S. T., on the 5th day of March, 1956, and will be thereafter be publicly opened and read. Proposals shall be addressed to the City of Heppner and mailed or delivered to the City Recorder of Heppner, Oregon in time to be in his hands by the above time of the opening. The proposed foot bridge includes placing of approximately 40 cubic yards of reinforced concrete in footings, piers, beams and slabs, containing 6200 pounds of reinforcing steel, and installation of approximately 700 pounds of 1 1/2 inch pipe railing and posts. Plans and specifications may be examined or obtained from the office of Clark, Groff and Cave, Engineers and Architects, 3240 Triangle Drive, Salem, Oregon or from the City Recorder at the City Hall in Heppner, Oregon. Qualified contractors may obtain copies of the plans and speci-

HELLS CANYON FIGHT A budget of \$62,500 of which all but \$14,000 has been raised, will be used to fight through courts the repeal from the recent decision giving the Idaho Power Company the right to erect a dam at Hells Canyon. J. F. Marr, executive secretary of the AFL told delegates of the Oregon State Farmers Union meeting in Salem last weekend.

The Farmers Union are to pay for contesting two dams above and two dams below the Hells Canyon site. The REA has sent in \$20,000. Marr said.

JOBLESS ROLLS UP About 4000 persons were added to the unemployment rolls in Oregon last month according to State Unemployment Compensation Commission reports issued Friday.

Compensation paid to workers in January totaled \$2,804,572.

FLOOD COMPENSATION A report made Monday by Col. A. M. Sheets, director of state civil defense, gave the first of-

ficial estimate of damage to the property in 16 western Oregon counties as being \$7,049,000.

Governor Elmo E. Smith was informed Friday that an additional half million dollars had been allocated to Oregon under the federal disaster act, bringing the total funds available to this state for repair of roads, bridges and other public works to \$650,000. So far this is the only allocated relief that has been made from federal funds. The Red Cross has met many emergency cases with food and shelter.

Cos County suffered the heaviest loss of all counties, with a total of \$1,600,198. Jackson was second while Nenton's \$56,020 was the lowest.

STATE FAIR HORSE SHOW The popular horse show and rodeo in the big Oregon State Fair stadium will return this year. Friday the state emergency board approved the use of profits, from State Fairs of other years, for building two new barns needed for the combined shows.

Wool Act Payment Details Outlined By OSC Economist

Mary's little lamb would have to go to school for more than one day to unravel the yarn. It's about bonus payments for wool under the U. S. department of agriculture's 1956 wool incentive program.

The USDA has announced that payments under the wool program beginning April 1 will be changed so that each producer who sells unshorn lambs will be eligible for payment on the weight increases while he owned the lambs, provided he owned the lambs 30 days or more. The current program made payments only on animals marketed for slaughter.

M. D. Thomas, Oregon State college agricultural economist, says the new provision boils down to this: growers of feeder lambs will now share directly in wool incentive payments. Under the old program, only the seller of fat lambs got the bonus.

Now the original grower will be eligible for payment based on the full live-weight of the lamb at the time he sells it. Each subsequent owner will be eligible for a payment only on that part of the weight produced during his ownership of at least 30 days. An additional requirement for the coming marketing year provides that payments will be made only on unshorn lambs.

Thomas explains that lambs bought before April 1 and marketed later will be paid for on the old basis of full liveweight at time of final sale.

This is to protect feeders and others who buy the animals before April 1 on the basis of the 1955 program.

Payments on 1955 lambs and wool will be made sometime this summer, the economist says. Claims should be filed soon with county agricultural stabilization and conservation offices. Incentive payments for lamb

Prefabricated Farm Buildings Designed By OSC Ag Engineer

Prefabricated farm buildings with standard, interchangeable units for easy assembly and alterations to meet changing farm needs are being developed at Oregon State college. Agricultural engineer L. W. Bonnicksen, who has designed and assembled a working model multi-use farm building, says blueprints are not available for distribution.

Low-cost, durable wood structure under test for the past year follows the principal of "toy building blocks". Economy and simplicity of construction are achieved with a pole-and-rafter frame that supports prefabricated panel walls and roofing. Rafters are hinged to the tops of the poles with bolts and special "split ring" connectors that increase strength of joints.

Building units could be fabricated by farmers, but Bonnicksen believes they could be made most economically by small local manufacturers with little investment in tooling. Units could be assembled into many types of farm buildings by farmers, local carpenters, or the manufacturer.

Main tools for erecting such buildings are a post-hole digger and a hoist to lift the building units into place. Wall and roof panels are bolted to the superstructure.

These Multi-use buildings should cost no more than "fixed" buildings, says Bonnicksen. Somewhat higher costs for materials in the prefab building would be offset by savings in labor costs for assembling.

The new type construction would permit "installment building" with easy expansion in the building's length or width. Since walls "hang" on the poles, it is
