

# Prizes, Bounty Set For Porky Contest

The Morrow county Hunters and Anglers club this week launched its fourth annual porcupine control contest with the winners due to receive some big prizes and every contestant eligible to collect a bounty on the animals.

The enlarged contest is aimed primarily at the control of the destructive porkys who cause serious damage not only to stands of pine timber in the forests but also to fruit trees, farm shelter trees, alfalfa fields and livestock.

Prizes have been awarded in past years to those bringing in the most noses, but this year's contest has an added incentive feature—a bounty of seven cents per nose will be paid for all the noses turned in during the duration of the contest which runs until the end of the year. The noses can be turned in to any of the following checking stations: Anderson's Builders Supply, Gilliam and Bisbee, Western Auto in Heppner; and the Monument store operated by Billy Settle. Noses turned in for bounties will also be counted in the final total for the grand prizes to be awarded next January, Vic Kriemeyer, chairman of the porcupine control committee, announced.

The seven cents bounty on each porky has been provided by the Heppner Pine Mills and the bounty is redeemable for an equal amount in sporting goods equipment. Each nose will be worth one point toward the prizes.

Donors of prizes or prize money include Frank Hamlin, Aikens, North Fork Timber Co., Heppner Soil Conservation district; Kinzua Pine Mills, Leo Flower, Kimberly; Claud Cox; Orville Cutsforth; Morrow County Livestock Growers; Frank Wilkinson; Morrow county court; Hardman Cattle Association and the Tamarack-Monument Cattle Association.

The contest begins immediately and open area includes all timbered, farm and range area contiguous to Heppner. There are no restrictions as to how the animals must be destroyed, the only requirement being that noses must be detached before being

turned in. Everyone is eligible for the prizes except forest service personnel, game commission, federal fish and wildlife personnel and state police. These persons however are eligible to collect bounties for noses.

Last year approximately 400 noses were turned in, Ken Keeling, Hunter and Angler president reported, and this year it is hoped that at least 2000 of the animals can be destroyed.

Others aiding Kriemeyer on his committee are Earl Gilliam and Bill Labhart.

# Echo Clouts Mustangs For 13 to 7 Victory

Echo, last year's state baseball champions, took a step forward to another gold cup as they downed the Heppner Mustangs in a hit filled tilt by a 13-7 score.

Ahead only 6-3, the Cougars blasted Mustang hurler, Dean Connor, for 3 hits the last inning to push across 7 runs while the Mustangs collected only 4 tallies on the same number of hits.

Although the blue and gold "9" matched Norm Bergstroms Cougars for the same number of hits, the errors made by the Mustangs far surpassed the Cougars as Heppner made 10 to the cats 5.

Heppner's first score of the game came in the third inning. Groshens received a free base on balls when he was dusted off with a wild pitch. Ruhl collected a base on balls but was forced out on Griffith's fluffed fielders choice. Gentry drove in Griffiths and Groshens with a long double. L. Tibbles smashed a double into right field to drive in Gentry and tie the score 3-3. Dougherty ended the inning with a pop fly to the Cougar first baseman.

Echo added another run in the fourth and 2 more in the sixth while the Mustangs could not collect one even though they banged out three hits during the same time.

In the "big seventh" with the score at a deciding 13-3 count the Mustangs suddenly caught fire and rifled 2 line driving singles and a whistling double to left field for 4 runs. Heppner's rally was cut short when Jim Morris went down swinging on a 1-2 count.

Big gun for the Mustangs was Burke Gentry who collected 4-2 and drove in 3 runs and collected 2 for himself.

This week the blue and gold diamond squad hosts the Ione Cardinals in a home game duel scheduled for 2:00 p. m.

Reports from track coach Jim Mallon's state that the Mustang cindermen will travel to the Pilot Rock Invitational track meet this Saturday.

Also on Coach Mallon's agenda is Morrow county Jr. Olympics which is slated for appearance on May 5 and Mallon reports that things are taking shape and that everything should be ready for the event.

The contest will feature all track athletes, both boys and girls under the age of 18 who wish to participate.

The 70th anniversary service being held this Sunday, April 15 at 11:15 a. m. will have historical significance as Karen Lundell, fourth generation of the Bergstrom family, and Paul John Peterson, fourth generation of the Peterson family, will be baptized.
