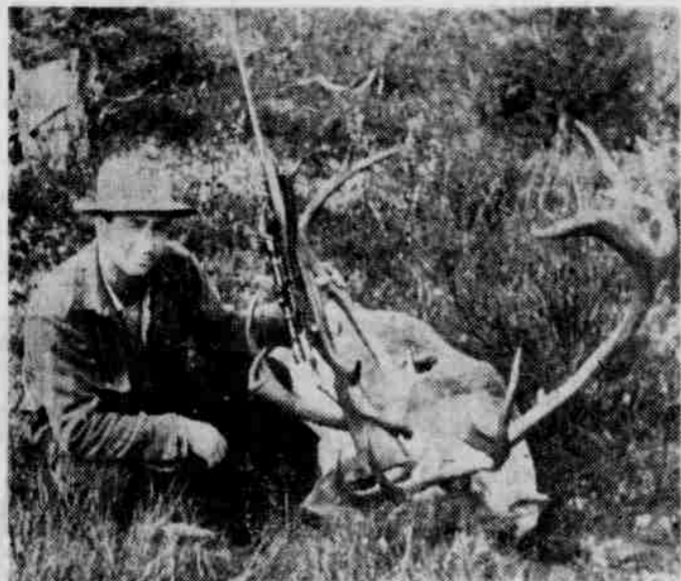

## Two Alaska Films To Be Presented at Gym Monday Night

The beauty, grandeur and excitement of life in Alaska will be portrayed at the Heppner school gymnasium Monday night, April 16 when the student council will sponsor the appearance of Ron Malcolm, widely known Alaskan sportsman, photographer and commentator.

Malcolm will present his two great feature color films "This Is Alaska," and "Tundra Haven". Spectators will see thrill-packed adventure through a hunter and fisherman paradise. In his personal narration, Malcolm will tell his six years' experience in Alaska.

Included in the two feature color films is a dramatic wolf hunt by airplane, killing the wolves with a shotgun; a dog team trek on a wilderness trap line; the only known photographic record of a mighty bull moose fight, plus hunting and fishing adventure at its best.

Photographed, compiled and completed over a full six years, the two color films include the rigors of life in Alaska throughout all seasons. Malcolm, according to those who have previewed the film, has accomplished what no other man has even approached in packing a whirlwind adventure into a historical record.

Malcolm will be here in person to narrate the picture and will also talk on the Alcon highway.
