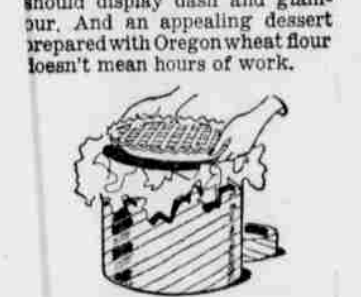

FASHION IN SPRING DESSERTS

Bright spring days call for gay, bright-tasting desserts. Like spring fashions, spring desserts should display dash and glamour. And an appealing dessert prepared with Oregon wheat flour doesn't mean hours of work.

Festive as that spring hat, it's no complaints from father, truly economical way to add an elegant touch to any meal.

Rhubarb Pie—Follow your usual-crust pie recipe. Good options are:

1 cup sifted enriched flour to 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup shortening and 1/4 cup water. Cut in shortening until lumps resemble small peas. Add sugar and mix only slightly. Roll out 1 line pan. Save 1/2 crust for lattice top of pie. Mix 1 1/2 cups sugar, 1/2 cup salt and 4 tablespoons flour. 1 1/2 cups diced rhubarb, 3 tablespoons melted butter, 1/2 cup orange rind, and a few drops color. Mix all ingredients together and let stand 15 minutes. Place in sked shell and cover with lattice top. Trim edges and flute. Bake 75 degrees for 40-50 minutes. Serve 1 fresh orange slice.

DREAM BARS

Together to a crumbly mixture, butter, 1 cup brown sugar and 1/2 cup flour. Spread in flat pan. Bake 10 degrees for 10 minutes. Cool, beat 4 eggs, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1/2 cup brown sugar together. Mix to 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup flour, 1/2 cup baking powder. Sift flour over 3 cups coconut and 2 cup nuts. Add to egg mix. Mix well. Pour over baked bars. Bake at 375 degrees for 20 min. Cool and cut in 1 1/2" squares.
