Mr. Newitt will replace George Timmons, Sunset Valley principal for the past four years.

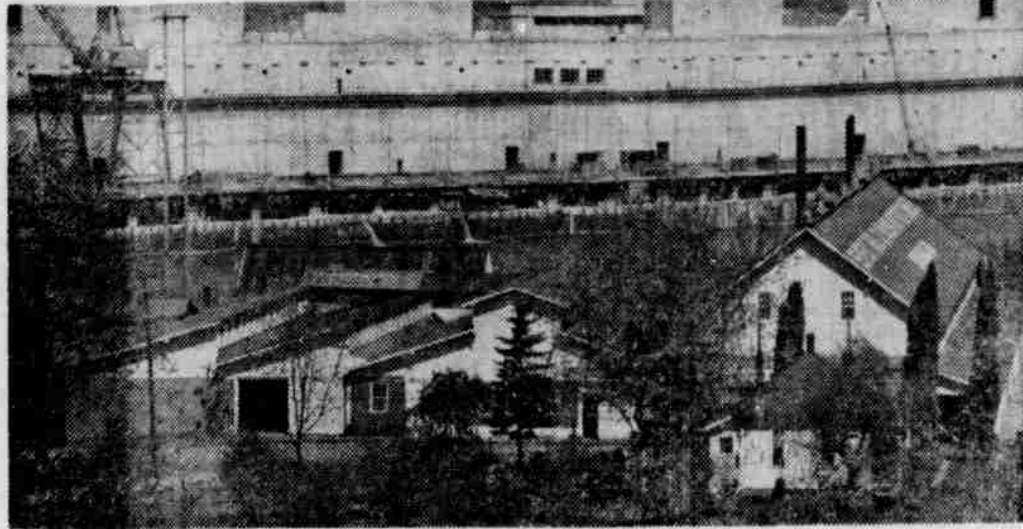
Ione News
