

Mustangs Take 2nd In District Meet

Mike Monahan and Skip Ruhl both long distance runners for the Heppner track squad, paced the Mustangs to runnerup position in the District 7B track meet with 29 points behind Pilot Rock who totaled 79½.

Monahan, who collected two firsts in the 880 yd. run and the mile run, and Ruhl, who captured the 440 yd. dash, collected 18½ of the Mustangs 29 tallies. They also nabbed berths in the state meet at Springfield this Friday and Saturday.

Ione's Cardinals, who have dominated the horses all spring in the track and field events could not muster the strength for the second place position but they did place two entrants to the state meet.

Other Morrow county schools that placed were Lexington with 13½ points while Joe Mann (Irrigon's one man track squad) collected first place honors in the high jump, third in broadjump, and fourth in the 100 yd. sprint for a total of 10 points.

Dean Connor, pole vaulter for the Heppner team has a very good chance to go to the state as this district's second place winner. Connor, who placed third in the event, was tied for second but lost out due to one too many misses. Prairie City's Cheadle who won the pole vault, will have to play on the Panthers baseball team who are representing their league in the district playoffs and may not be able to compete at the state meet.

Condon Man Killed In Boardman Wreck

James Ogilvy Stewart, Jr. 25, of Condon was killed early Sunday morning when the car he was driving left highway 730 east of Boardman and rolled over several times.

According to coroner Oliver Creswick and Sheriff C. J. D. Bauman who investigated, the accident apparently occurred between 4:30 and 5 a. m. when the car left the road while traveling at a high rate of speed. Stewart was thrown from the car.

Faculty Bows To Mustang Nine in Close 9-8 Contest

Lance Tibbles, Heppner varsity first sacker, played manager-player yesterday afternoon as the Mustang regulars hung a 9-8 defeat on the Heppner faculty.

Big gun for the day, was Heppner hurler, Mac Griffith, who sent 13 batsmen down swinging and hit 2 for 2 at the plate.

Griffith set 2 of his 13 strikeouts down in the first inning while he drove across one run. Tibbles brought Griffith home on a long triple to right field but was nipped at the plate as he tried to stretch it into a round trip.

The Mustangs added one more tally in the second with two hits while the "profs" under the long ball hitting of "Charley" Huggett came up with two runs.

By the fifth panel the "school-boys" had posted an 8-2 lead on 7 hits and 5 teacher errors.

Rallying from a six point deficit, the teachers slammed out four hits for five runs and a fifth inning score of 8-7.

Griffith gave the blue and gold a two run lead in the seventh when he took home on Doherty's sacrifice fly.

Again the "profs" rallied as Larry Downen opened the final frame with a tremendous triple to center field. "Jumpin' Jim" Popham brought him home with a sharp single. John "Swivel-arm" Snyder and "Charley" Huggett blasted out first base trips to load the bases.

Griffith at this point was in a dangerous position for there were none out, last of the seventh, the bases were loaded and the score board read 9-8.

Jim Mallon, a long ball hitter, stepped to the plate and on Griffith's first delivery grounded in to a double play to help erase the threat. "Grif" then bore down and sent the faculty man "Viv" White down swinging.

Snyder was tagged for the loss although Downen took over in the last three frames to pitch 3-hit ball.

Behind the big bats of Burke Gentry and Skip Ruhl, the Mustangs took a 7-0 lead in the first three innings while Griffith pitched no-no ball.

Coach Larry Downen's Mustangs ran their game total higher with four runs in the fourth and fifth periods.

Irrigon blooped out their first and only hit in the same inning but the runner died on base to protect the shutout.

Subs took command of the game in the last frame and held the Comets to a standstill while they added their final three runs.

Griffith notched his third win against two defeats for a final years percentage of .600 while Edwards of Irrigon was bumped for the loss.

CANNED PORCUPINE MAY SOON BE FOUND ON GROCERY STORE SHELVES

The possibility was seen this week that the rules of the Morrow County Hunters and Anglers porcupine contest may have to be changed—that maybe the best part of the animal is being left in the woods.

The rules now require contestants to bring in only the noses of the animals for credit and bounty, but a letter received this week may change all that.

Ken Keeling, club president, this week received a letter from Reese Finer Foods, Inc., of Chicago, saying that the company is in the business of creating, preparing, promoting and canning foods which are unusual on the American market, and that they know a way of preparing porcupine as this animal is frequently eaten.

They asked that two frozen porcupine carcasses be sent to them and in return they will supply the sender with some samples of canned porcupine for trial.

Keeling hopes that if the canned porcupine proves popular on the American food market that may

be a new industry can be started in Morrow county, inasmuch as there is plenty of the raw product running around loose in the area chewing up trees etc.

The letter was written to the Western Pine Association and was forwarded on to Keeling.

It was emphasized, however, that until a market is established for "eating Porcupine", the present contest rules still apply. Noses only.

Regarding the local contest, Stanley Musgrave of Monument is well ahead of all other porcupine hunters with over 100 noses to his credit.
