

50,000 Legal Trout Released in Streams

Nearly 50,000 seven to ten-inch rainbow trout have been released in many northeast region streams in the last 20 days. The fat, scrappy newcomers to northeast waters were released from the Oak Springs and Wallowa hatcheries. The number stocked is only part of the total allocated for area streams in 1956. Plantings will be made at regular intervals during the remainder of the spring and summer to insure a supply of trout for the angler. Releases are most generally made on the larger streams that are accessible at all times to the public.

The streams stocked thus far in Zone 7 includes: the Umatilla river, both forks of Birch Creek, Willow, Rhea, Canyon, Thirty Mile, Rock and Butte creeks. The streams in Zone 9 which were stocked with April and part of May allocations were: The Wallowa, Grande Ronde, Powder and upper Burnt rivers, plus Prairie, Little Sheep, Catherine and Eagle creeks. In addition, 10,000 large rainbow were released in Wallowa Lake along with 93,000 blue back fry.

Stocking will continue in both Zones 7 and 9 at a rapid pace through the months of May and June. Liberations will be made into July in the higher streams along forested areas where summer camping comes into its own after the Fourth of July.

Meat Storage Hints Given by Specialists

Have trouble with fresh poultry and meat drying out in your refrigerator?

If you do, chances are that you're not storing it properly. Dorothy Sherrill, consumer education specialist at Oregon State college, says that pre-packaged meat services in today's markets leave many homemakers confused about the best ways to store meat when they get it home.

"It's tempting to store fresh poultry and meat in their clear plastic wrappings as it comes from the market," says Miss Sherrill. "But don't do it."

The OSC specialist suggests that ends of the package be torn open or that the meat be completely unwrapped from its store covering and loosely re-wrapped in waxed paper to allow some air circulation.

Purpose of the farm youth exchange program is to further world relations by improving understanding of attitudes, hopes and problems of rural people in various countries, Mrs. Gillen says.

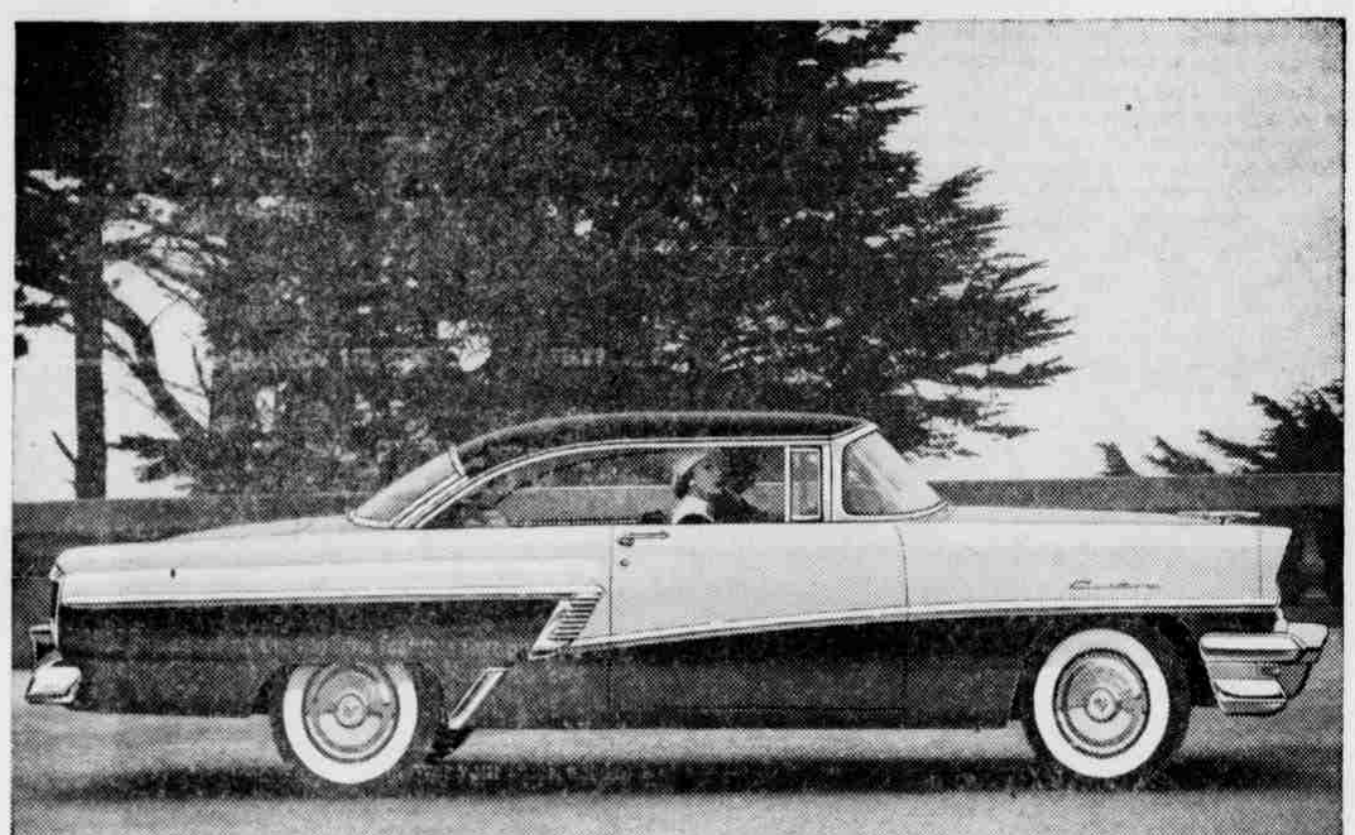
