Charles Roach, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Roach Sr. of Monument and Kimberly, passed away Saturday morning after suffering severe burns on most of his body Tuesday afternoon when the fuel tank of a tractor exploded. The accident occurred at the old Slocum ranch on Deer Creek. The boy was repairing a tractor in the hay field at the time. He was given first aid at Monument and then taken to the John Day general hospital. Later he was transferred by plane to the Providence hospital in Portland. "Brownie" Roach, as he was known, had been active in 4-H club work in Grant county most of his life and he attended Eastern Oregon College last year as a freshman. ## Traffic Violations Drop During June

Drivers apparently did a better job of obeying Oregon traffic laws in June than previously. For the first month this year the number of traffic violation convictions dropped below 10,000 with 9,274 reported to the department of motor vehicles. The department's drivers license division suspended 750 licenses, 415 of them under provisions of the state's financial responsibility law, 159 upon court recommendation and 176 through discretionary action of the office. Reasons for suspension included: driving while intoxicated, 326; reckless driving, 53; violation of basic rule, 34; hit and run, 14; failure to report an accident, 63; and driving record, 81.

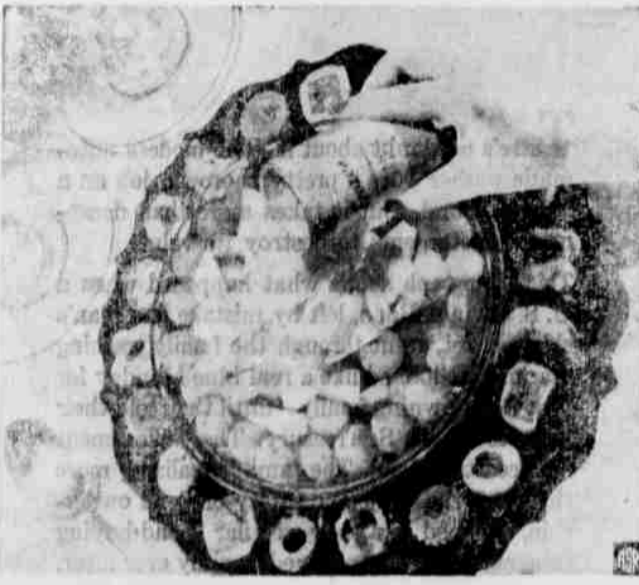
Each conviction as well as all accidents are recorded on a driver's personal file. Presence of too many accidents or violation convictions in a 12-month period can lead to license suspension. 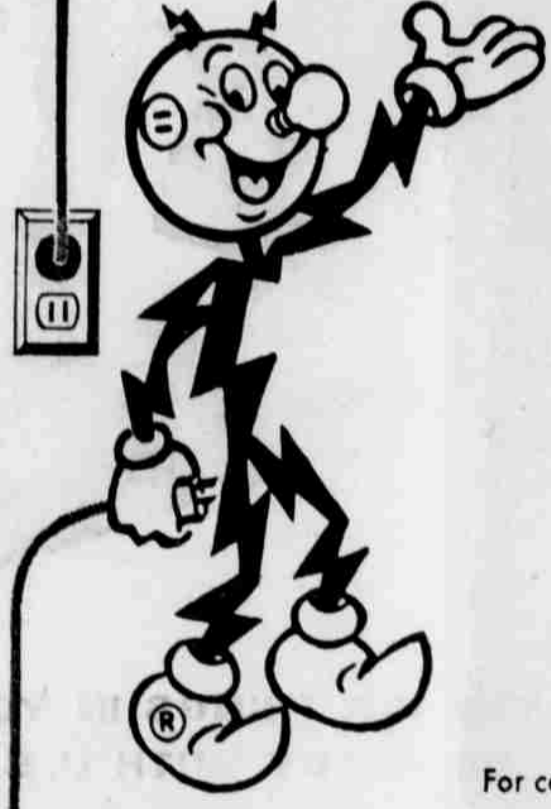
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
