

Donated Foods Aid School Lunch Fund

The wholesale value of donated commodities distributed to Morrow county school lunch programs during the fiscal year ending July 1 amounted to \$6,436.94, according to information received by Jack C. Flug, county school superintendent.

"We have listed the quantities and the wholesale value of the government 'donated' commodities distributed to Morrow county school lunch programs," reported Laura P. Wells, director of the Oregon school program, state department of education, Salem. "The list includes many of the high priced meat and dairy products which mean so much to the programs financially as well as nutritionally."

"It is interesting to note that if all of the donated foods in the Morrow county schools had been completely utilized they would have had a cash value of .054c per plate served. By contrast, the cash assistance available this year averaged less than .032c per plate. Donated commodities remaining in inventories at the end of the school year averaged only .003c per plate in your county. The lunch room managers are to be congratulated on their utilization of the donated foods," the report noted.

The commodities donated during the year: 100 cases butter, \$2,080; 59 cases cheese, \$715.85; 44 cases dried milk, \$440; 18 cases shortening, \$180.50; 19 cases cherries, \$112.10; 36 cases grapefruit, \$175.32; 37 cases peas, \$129.50; 13 bags rice, \$58.50; 10 sacks dried beans, \$88.70; 17 hampers sweet potatoes, \$106.25; 20 1/2 bushel plums, \$47; 35 cases tomatoes, \$134.75; 11 cases peanut butter, \$178.20; 12 cases dried apricots, \$114; 10 cases concentrated orange juice, \$112.50; 7 cases lard, \$32.92; 11 cases luncheon meat, \$267.30; 22 cases frozen beef, \$396; 19 cases pork and gravy, \$378.55 and 12 cases canned hams, \$468.

Flug emphasized that the \$6,436.94 was wholesale value and to purchase the same quantity retail would require a considerably larger sum.

City Center Motel Now in Operation

The City Center Motel in the Case building on Main street is now in operation with three units of a planned nine-unit project now completed, according to Ray Ayers, manager. A total of five units are expected to be finished by fair time.

Approximate cost of the remodeling project is about \$1,000 with the most of the work being done by Ayers with all materials purchased locally. Two units downstairs include kitchens and all units contain showers and complete toilet facilities.

The motel office is located next to the barber shop in the building which also contains businesses and apartments. The units, owned by the Case estate are open to the public for inspection, Ayers said.

Beef Increases in U. S. Diet

More meat is going into the family diet with the emphasis on beef, according to United States department of agriculture reports compiled at Oregon State college.

Mrs. Elvera Horrell, extension agricultural economist, says that we'll eat about 1 1/2 pounds more beef this year than last. In 1939, an estimated 64 pounds of pork and 54 pounds of beef were eaten by each American. According to last year's figures these numbers have been upped to 66 pounds of pork apiece and 81 pounds of beef, Mrs. Horrell reports.
