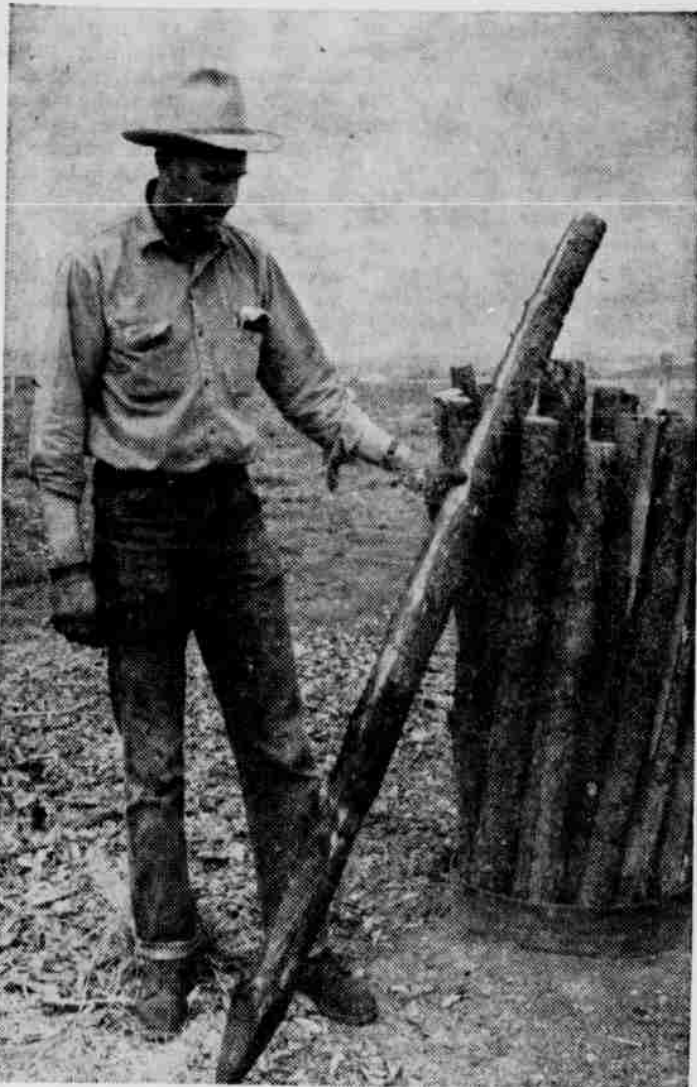


Mercury Climbs to At Boardman
