Soil Bank Contract Deadline Sept. 21 For Wheat Growers

Oregon wheat producers must decide soon if they want to take part in the 1957 acreage reserve program of the soil bank, reports Marion Thomas, Oregon State college agricultural economist.

He says a recent announcement from the U. S. department of agriculture set September 21 of this year as the deadline for signing contracts under the program. In Oregon, the acreage reserve program is limited to farmers who have established wheat acreage allotments. "New Farm" allotments don't qualify for the program.

The acreage reserve program aims to reduce the accumulated surplus which has been bearing down on wheat market prices, Thomas says. National wheat supplies for the marketing year that began July 1 are estimated at 1,974,000,000 bushels—up 3,000,000 bushels over a year ago and at a new all-time high.

Under the acreage reserve program, a farmer agrees to plant less wheat than his allotment for 1957. Payments are then made to the farmer to compensate him for the loss of net income from wheat that would have been grown on the acres he placed under the acreage reserve.

The amount each farmer will receive depends on the number

of acres he puts in the reserve, the normal crop yield of these acres, and the acreage reserve rate per bushel set for the county the farmer lives in. The program will be administered through county agricultural stabilization and conservation (ASC) committees.

Thomas reports that the 1957 acreage reserve rate for wheat has been announced by the secretary of agriculture at a national average of \$1.20 per bushel—80 cents less than the national minimum support price for 1957 wheat. The rate for individual counties will be announced soon.

The amount of acreage that can be placed in the acreage reserve is allocated county by county, Thomas says. And since contracts will be accepted on a first-come-first served basis, farmers are urged to contact their local ASC office soon if they are thinking about taking part in the program.
