

Maupin Falls Before Mustangs; League Play Opens With Umatilla

Coach Jim Mallon's Mustang gridmen met the Maupin Redskins Friday evening, September 21, and when the encounter was over the Mustangs had gained their most impressive win of the still young season by a score of 20-7.

The Mustangs scored once in the first half and twice in the second in gaining this important triumph.

In the first quarter the Mustangs received the kick and returned it to the 50 yard line. From here they advanced to the Redskins 40 yard stripe in 3 plays, then a Mustang fumble was recovered by the Redskins. But the Mustangs were not to be out-

done, as Dick Robinson intercepted a Maupin pass. From here the Mustangs line smashed and went 14 yards for the first 6 points in the ball game.

From then to the intermission both teams battled in a scoreless effort.

After the half-time break the Redskins fought back in desperate effort, but this was of no avail as the Horsemen racked up 13 more counters. Not until the closing minutes did the Redskins get their score.

The Mustangs defense was much improved as the defensive line showed considerably more spark than they have shown all year.

In the statistics department the Mustangs netted 322 yards and 14 first downs to the Redskins 182 yards and 8 first downs.

The Mustangs open their league play Friday afternoon, September 28 when they travel to Umatilla where they meet the much improved Vikings. Both teams have yet to gain a league victory so this is shaping up to be a real tussle.

Cattle Prices Up But Seasonal Decline is Expected

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Fat cattle prices have hit their highest levels in two years as a result of increased public buying power and less beef and pork at retail markets, according to M. D. Thomas, Oregon State college agricultural economist.

This doesn't mean that the recent rise in fat cattle prices will be constant, Thomas writes in the latest issue of the OSC Farm and Market Outlook circular.

Prices of high grade fed steers and heifers usually decline from an early fall high to a spring low, and the economist believes the pattern will likely repeat this year. Cattle numbers are at a standstill after increasing since 1949, and could tip either way next January, Thomas says.

Although prices for feeder cattle have been strengthened by the current fat cattle market, Thomas believes there will be some seasonal easing of prices later this fall as more stockers and feeders come off ranges. But price declines like those of last fall are very unlikely, he adds.

Nationally, cattle slaughter so far this year has been about four percent larger than in 1955, reports W. Y. Fowler, OSC livestock marketing specialist. Beef production may exceed 14 billion pounds and set a new record, and expected beef consumption will soar to around 83 pounds per person this year as a result of increased production and marketing.

Fowler points out that the 1956 increase in slaughter has been almost entirely in steers for the first six months of the year. Heifer slaughter was up slightly compared to the first six months of 1955 and cow slaughter was down about 10 percent. This means another large calf crop in 1957 and almost rules out any big increase in cattle prices, the OSC specialists say.

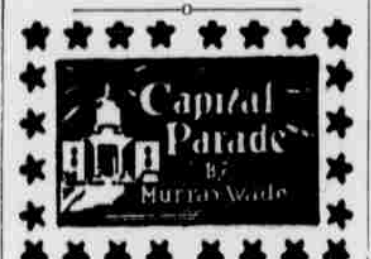

NEWSPAPER WEEK

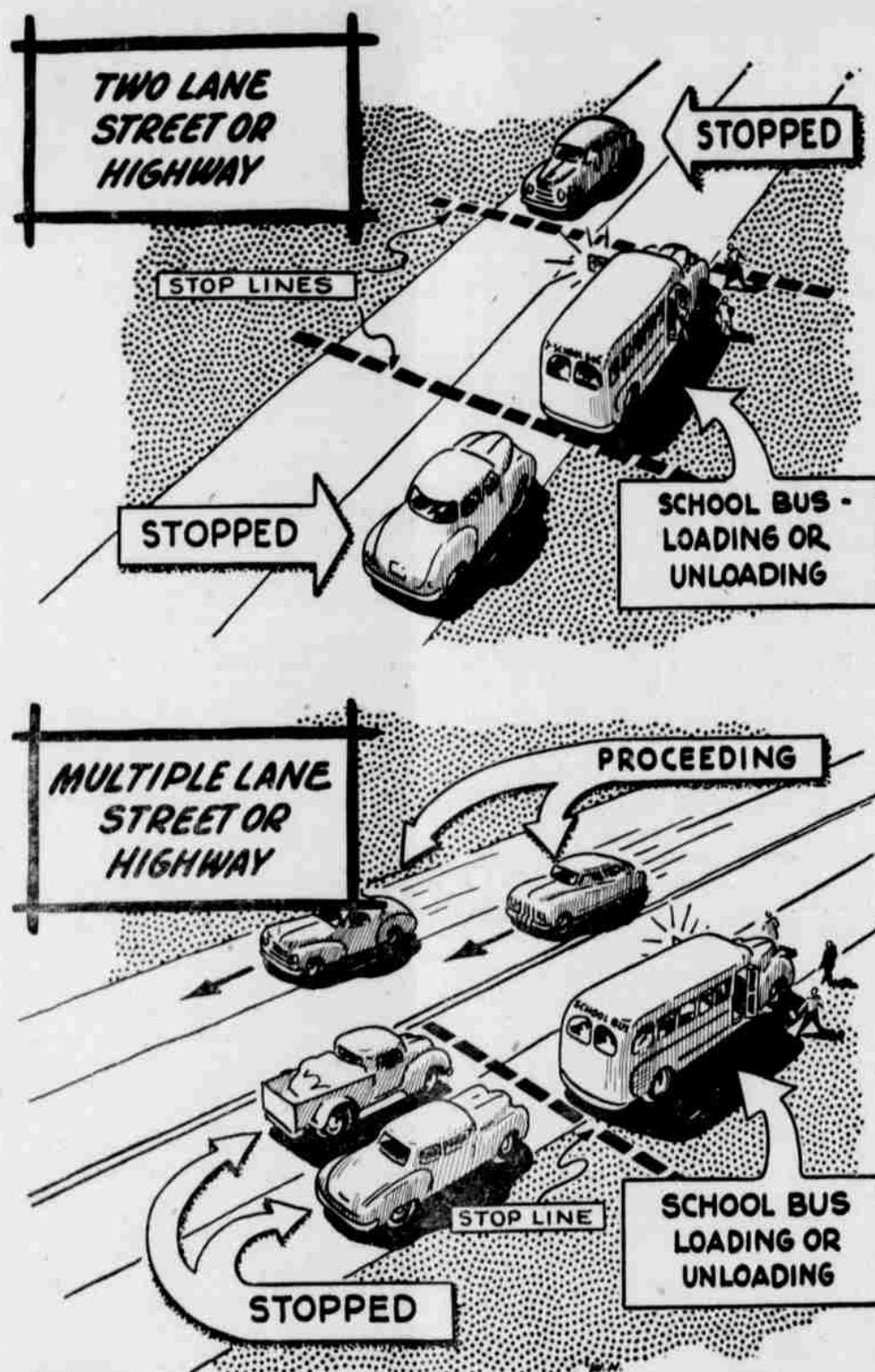

Now that school buses are operating again, Oregon drivers are required to stop whenever they encounter a bus stopped to load or unload children. The above illustration shows how the law works. On a two-lane road, you must stop when meeting or overtaking a school bus and must remain stopped as long as any children are leaving the bus or crossing the road. On roads with three or more lanes, as illustrated in the lower drawing, you must stop only if you're traveling in the same direction as the bus. The law applies on city streets as well as rural areas and drivers must stop whether or not the driver is displaying the school bus stop arm.

Clarence M. Turley, president of the National Association of Real Estate Boards who recently made extensive European tours says the super shopping center idea has not taken hold on the continent. ELECTION COSTS RISE
Oregon counties will pay the heavy end of the costs of the general election.

Of the total costs, approximately \$325,000, the counties will contribute \$200,000 and the state \$125,000.

The counties' costs will be for printing, rent of voting places, payment of election board officials and supplies. The state's costs involves election forms and incidentals. Transport of state supplies to counties began last week. David O'Hara, state election registrar, estimates that election costs have almost doubled in the past 10 years, due largely to the increase in the cost of paper, printing and to the increase in compensation for election boards.

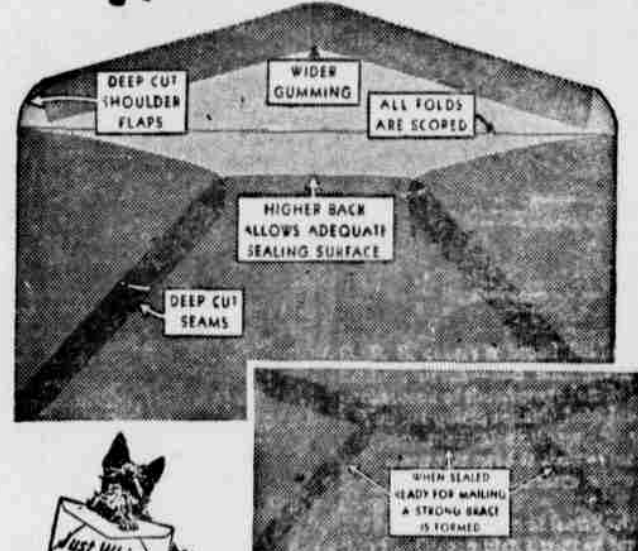

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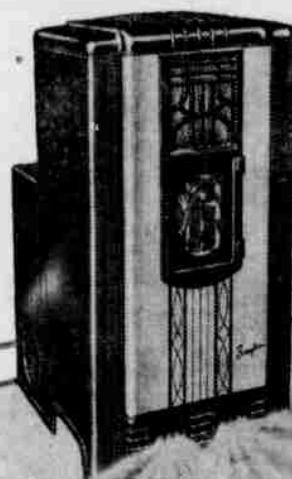
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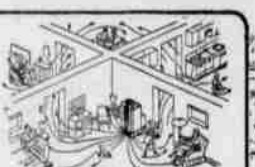
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
