C. 791a-825c) by Public Utility District No. 1 of Klickitat County, Washington, of Golden-dale, Washington, for preliminary permit for proposed water power Project No. 2218, known as the John Day Project, to be located on the Columbia River in the region of Boardman, Castle Rock, Irrigon, Adlington, and Umatilla, Oregon, and Alderdale, Roosevelt, Luzon, Plymouth, and Patterson, Washington, and in Gilliam and Morrow Counties, Oregon, and Klickitat and Benton Counties, Washington, affecting United States Government lands and navigable waters of the United States. The proposed project would comprise a concrete gravity dam having a gated spillway section, 1,310 feet long, an intake and powerhouse section 1,298 feet long, and several connecting non-overflow gravity sections aggregating 1,192 feet in length, creating a reservoir with normal pool at elevation 255 feet extending 75 miles upstream to McNary Dam; a navigation lock; fishways; a powerhouse with initial installation of 13 units, each turbine rated at 134,000 horsepower and direct connected to a generator rated at 85,000 kilowatts at 93 feet rated head and provisions for expansion of the powerhouse for ultimate installation of 18 units; and appurtenant facilities. The power generated would be used to serve the applicant's customers and to meet the requirements of an expected industrial growth. The preliminary permit, if issued, shall be for the sole purpose of application for a license under the terms of the Federal Power Act for the proposed project. Protests or petitions to intervene may be filed with the Federal Power Commission, Washington 25, D. C., in accordance with the Rules of Practice and Procedure of the Commission (18 CFR 1.8 or 1.10). The last day upon which protests or petitions may be filed is November 8, 1956. The application is on file with the Commission for public inspection. Leon M. Fugatey, Secretary. 30-33c

Continued from Page 2 so. Volunteer rye in many of our fields throughout the county is the biggest weed problem that wheat growers have. Where other weeds are controlled by selective sprays or are relatively easy to get rid of through timely cultivations, rye persists in the ground for years and years. It is a constant problem once established. Tetra Pektus rye is considerably different than our common rye varieties. While I would

not claim that it would not become the problem that ordinary rye has become in wheat fields, farmers who have been growing it for the past two years claim that it is much easier to keep under control. One of the characteristics which it has, even though the head is loose appearing, it does not shatter easily. In the Mid-West it is left in the field until it is dead-ripe without shattering. Its extremely strong straw and resistance to shattering makes this possible. It has an extremely large berry with the heavy capacity for large fields and milling qualities are excellent. A sample taken to the Pendleton Grain Growers for a protein test by E. M. Baker, Ione, showed 12.8% protein test this year. Because of the large seed which is three times the size of ordinary rye, it sprouts and emerges very rapidly. Four and five inch emerges in five days after planting is not uncommon.

In the Mid-West it has been found to be less winter-hardy than ordinary rye varieties, however, farmers in the Horse Heaven and Bickleton areas in Washington that have grown a big acreage of the rye claim that it's winter hardiness is excellent. It does need the opportunity to become well established during about a three week period after planting. This seems to be the most precarious life cycle of the plant as it must get its tap roots established securely during this period. It has been found that it is best to plant it early and get a heavy stand established in the fall or else plant it real late so that it just germinates and emerges before freeze-up. Due to the nature of its breeding, it must not be allowed to cross with ordinary rye because this will cause sterility. Fields should be isolated from common rye fields by a quarter of a mile. This new rye looks especially good for pasture, hay and ensilage. It would make better ensilage than hay because of its large stock, however, the big wide leaves make a heavy forage that looks very promising for their uses. While there are no detailed long-time yield results on this new type of rye, yields reported in Umatilla and Morrow counties have been excellent.

Once again, the livestock men who did a good dehorning job last spring are receiving a premium for this. Last week, with at least three buyers in the area looking for weaner calves, all insisted on dehorned calves. One southern California buyer indicated that he would not buy horned calves under any conditions, while other buyers were offering 1c less for calves with horns on. They were reluctant to take these even at this discount. Little contracting has been done, however, offers of \$16.50 for heifers and \$18.50 for steers from the better quality herds have been made.

With numerous reports of increased smut in wheat this year, many of our farmers are turning to HCB as the treatment. Treatment does not completely eliminate smut from soil-borne spores, but it proved four to seven times more effective than the long used, standard mercury treating materials for reducing smut in regional tests this year. One ounce per bushel of the 40% formulation is used.

Cash Farm Income Up in Oregon But Net Returns Down

Oregon had more cash farm income last year, but it wasn't all gravy, reports Mrs. Elvera Horrell, extension agricultural economist at Oregon State college.

Cash sales of Oregon's farm products last year came within a hair's breath of \$400 million, she found. Adding to that what farmers got in the way of government payments, the value of home-grown products used on the farm, and an estimate of the rental value of farm dwellings gives a gross farm income in Oregon last year of \$445 million—\$13 million above 1954.

However, there was a race between income and outgo last year, Mrs. Horrell says. By the time close to \$300 million in production expenses were paid and an adjustment made for inventories, Oregon farmers had a net farm income left of only \$144.4 million—\$700,000 less than in 1954 and the lowest net farm income in the state since records were started in 1949.

Bright spot was that this total net income didn't have to spread over so many farms. And, according to a report from the agricultural marketing service, this brought the net farm income per farm in Oregon up to an average of \$2,532—\$26 above 1954. The amount was still \$771 below the peak in 1951, however.

Oregon farms averaged around \$200 above the national average net farm income in 1955, ranking 18th among the 48 states, Mrs. Horrell found. Range among the states was wide, with highest per-farm incomes in the west and lowest in the south.

What's happening this year? Mrs. Horrell reports that Oregon's cash receipts from sales of farm products the first seven months of 1956 were running behind the same months last year. Nationally, prices on production items during the first quarter of the year were first-quarter prices in 1955, but had caught up by mid-year.

10th Oregon Town, Country Church Conference Slated

Oregon's tenth annual Town and Country Church conference will be held October 15 to 18 at Oregon State college. Theme of this year's public interdenominational conference is "Knowing the Community".

Program at the conference will revolve around three community surveys completed this summer in the Jefferson, Echo, and Waldport-Yachats communities.

Each community study will be presented by a panel of persons from that community the survey leader, and a trained sociologist. Workshop sessions based on the panel presentations will then give those attending practical experience in interpreting results of a community survey.

Speakers during general sessions of the conference will include Jack Wright, director of the bureau of community development at the University of Washington, Seattle; Dr. Will Herberg, professor at Drew university, Madison, N. J. and author of the new book, "Protestant-Catholic-Jew"; and Dr. John M. Foskett, acting head of the department of sociology at the University of Oregon.

Again this year, rural churches will receive cash awards in a contest for improvement of church buildings and grounds. Awards will be made at an October 15 dinner.

The conference opens for registration and housing assignments October 15 at 10 a. m. The program starts that afternoon at 1:30 and continues until noon, October 18.

More information on the program, and advance registration blanks for lodging during the conference, may be obtained from local churches and country extension offices.
