

Mustangs Open League Play With Victory; Tough Game Due Friday

Heppner's Mustangs traveled to Umatilla Friday afternoon September 28 where they encountered a scrappy Viking eleven and were barely able to win as they squeaked by to a 6-0 victory in a hard fought gridiron battle. This game was the Mustang's first league tussle of the year and the win enabled them to open their league campaign of the 1956 season successfully.

The first quarter opened with a bang as the Horsemen returned the kick-off to their twenty. From here they started a drive for the goal. But this drive was stopped by the Vikings as they intercepted a Mustang aerial on their own 45 and began their march downfield but this was futile as they lost the ball on downs. The Mustangs took over on their own 42 as the quarter ended. And as the next quarter began, rolled all the way to a T. D. The try for point was no good and at intermission time the score stood 6-0.

The second half turned out to be an exhibition of defensive play as neither team could get an offense to click but were successful in getting their defenses to hold and as a result both teams toiled to a scoreless deadlock. The game ended 6-0 in favor of the Mustangs as they gained their first league game.

In statistics the Mustangs netted 171 yards . . . and 9 first downs to the Vikings 122 yards and 6 first downs.

This week the Mustangs play perhaps their most important game as they meet the high riding Stanfield Tigers. The Tigers have never been scored on or held scoreless this season as they have won games by margins of 45-44, and 34 points.

The Mustangs are hoping to change this as they themselves have three victories in a row under their belt. The game will be played Friday evening, October 5, at the Tiger's home field.

State Water Resource Organizations to Hold Joint Meeting

For the first time all principal water resource organizations in Oregon will convene in Salem on October 18 and 19. This announcement was made by Marion T. Weatherford, chairman of the Upper Columbia River Projects committee.

Prominent speakers will feature this meeting being held at the Marion Hotel, in Salem, and will include Governor Elmo Smith, Major General E. C. Itchner, Chief of the Corps of Engineers; Fred G. Aandahl, Assistant Secretary of the Interior in charge of water and power; William C. Welsh, secretary-manager of the National Reclamation Association; and Harold T. Nelson, regional director, Bureau of Reclamation.

Separate as well as joint meetings are scheduled since most of the groups will use this opportunity for their annual meetings. In addition to the Upper Columbia group, the other organizations meeting at this time will include the Oregon Reclamation Congress and the Willamette Basin Projects Committee, host organizations; in Douglas County Water Resources Advisory Committee, the Coos-Coquille Project Committee and the State Water Resources Board.

All water users are welcome to attend. A program is being planned for ladies attending, according to Mrs. Floyd Fox of Silverton. The arrangements committee hopes that Eastern Oregon will be well represented at this first joint meeting.

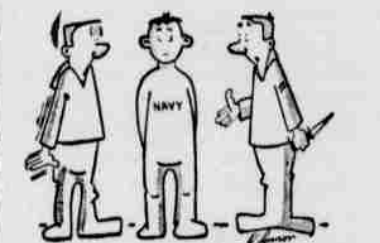
