## Broiler Fryers Extra Good Buy During November

Tender, juicy fried chicken has always been a springtime favorite, but Oregon consumers can now enjoy broiler fryers the year around, advises an extension specialist from Oregon State college.

According to Zelma Beigle, OSC food marketing specialist, broiler fryers are especially good buys during Nov. because there are about one-fifth more of them on the market now than there were at this time last year. Oregon fryer growers have increased their production about one-third this year to satisfy the growing demand for the succulent birds.

To help the food buyer save money, she suggests filling extra freezer space with broiler fryers while prices are low and saving 5 to 7 pennies on every bird by purchasing whole instead of cut-up pieces.

"Marketing of young chickens has gone a long way since Grandmother's day," says Miss Beigle. "No fuss or muss is required now in picking feathers or cleaning chickens, since they come ready

to cook."

Back in the thirties, more than 90 percent of the chickens used for table eating came from farm flocks that were used mainly for egg production. Today, more than two-thirds of the chickens eaten come from specialized broiler farms.

Use of antibiotics in poultry processing has increased the shelf

life of fresh and frozen poultry, the specialist explains. Wonder drugs are added to chill tanks during the processing. Whether antibiotics fed before slaughter will increase poultry shelf life is under study at present.

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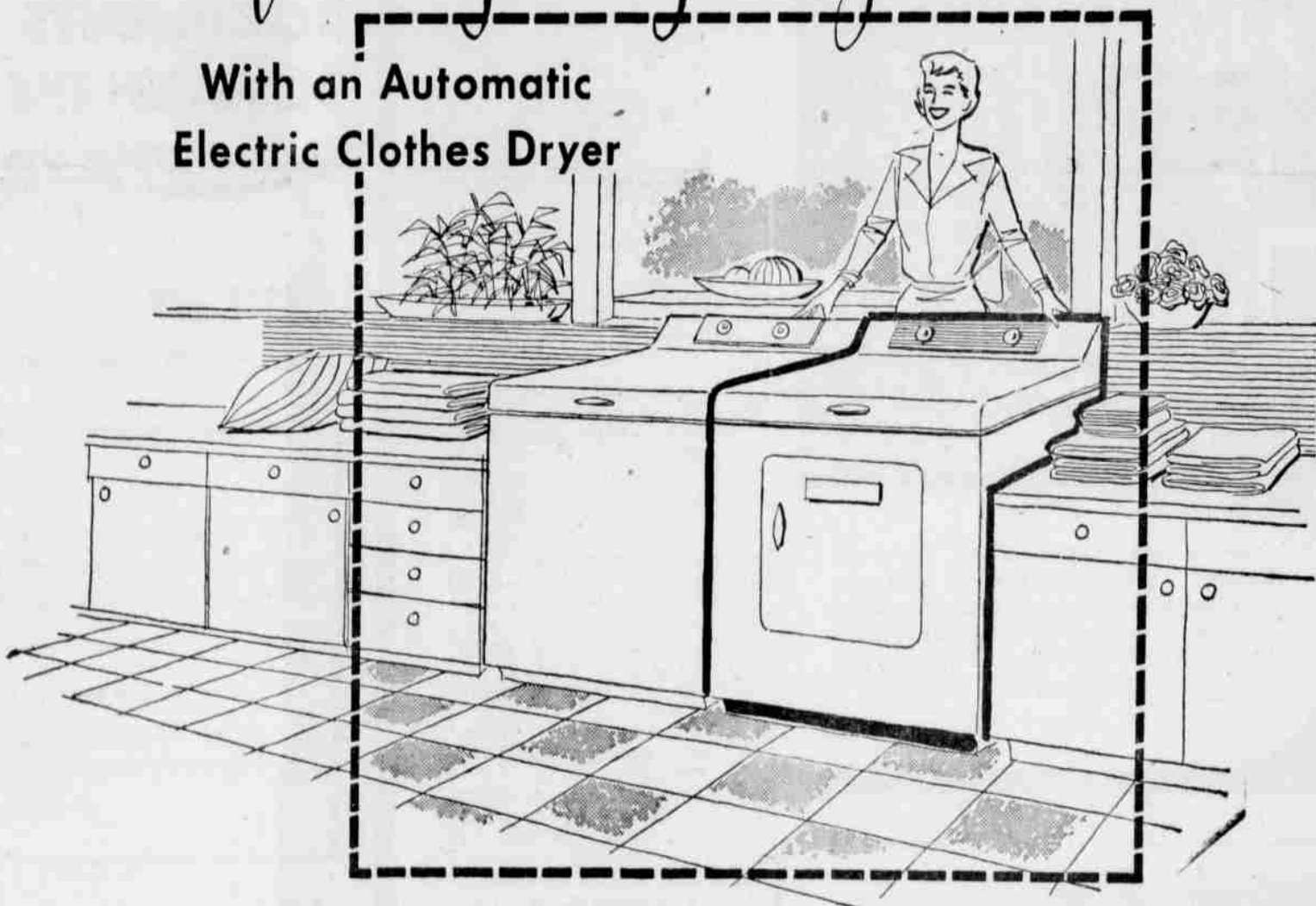


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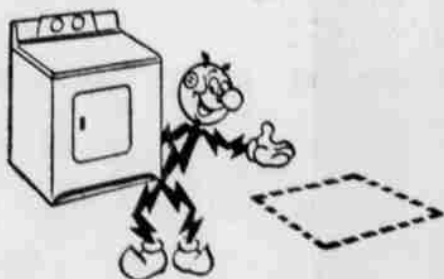


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
